SOME INFORMATION ABOUT BATS

Excerpts from Understanding Bats by Kim Williams and Rob Mies

What good are bats?

Bats provide humans with many benefits. Microbats eat millions of pounds of insects nightly, saving farmers millions of dollars in pesticides, and saving the average home owner a great deal of money in insect repellant and electricity for running expensive bug zappers.

Bats also pollinate plants, disperse seeds and provide food for natural predators.

Do bat houses really work?

Yes. Once a colony is established, they will use the same house every year. In cold climates the bats will leave the bat house in the fall to hibernate and will return in the spring to raise their young.

Where and how do I place the bat house?

Bat houses should be placed on a tree, pole, house, barn, garage, or any other structure tat is at least 15 feet tall. The higher the bat house is placed, the better your chances of attracting bats. When erecting a bat house, you should keep in mind that houses attached to trees usually attract bats one season later than houses attached to structures or poles, probably because the tree canopy conceals the houses. Two bat boxes placed back to back on a pole offer the greatest chance of attracting bats.

Houses should be positioned so that they face south or southeast, preferably so that they get morning sunlight. Bats like their houses very warm. If you live in the north



you can paint the exterior of the bat house black to maximize the house's heat absorption. Be sure to use non-toxic paint and never paint the inside of the house.


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
