Reflections on the past and present life of St. Philip's Anglican Church, Milford

Celebrating Seder

This year the congregation of St. Philip's and their invited guests will gather in community to share a Passover Seder Supper as part of Holy Week.

Passover, which lasts seven days, is the oldest and most important religious festival in Judaism. It commemorates God's deliverance of the Hebrews from slavery in Egypt. It is a time of celebration, thanksgiving, and renewal. The Seder (Hebrew for 'order' because the meal follows a defined order) is a communal feast, rich in liturgy and symbolism, which allows for the retelling of the ancient story of the Exodus, all the while, exhorting the Jewish people to remember their identity as the People of God. Everyone in the family from the oldest to the youngest participates.

"Why would a Christian church celebrate a Jewish holiday?", you may ask. I certainly asked that question the first time I encountered this type of event at St. Bartholomew's Anglican Church in Ottawa. Subsequently, the Seder turned out to be one of the most meaningful parts of Holy Week for me as it helped set the scene for Christ's Passion.

Many Christians have come to see celebration of Seder as a bridge between Old and New Testaments times. It is a way to honour the Old Testament traditions and heritage which we share with our Jewish brothers and sisters. We are reminded that Jesus was a Jew. In the last week of his life, he traveled to Jerusalem to celebrate Passover with his disciples. He used the occasion of the Passover meal to explain his ministry to his disciples one last time. It was during this Last Supper that Jesus introduced us to the New Covenant of Holy Eucharist, which we use to this day as a memorial to remind us of his death and resurrection. In the Eucharist, Christ is present to us. Just as God delivered the Hebrews from slavery those many years ago, Jesus suffered and died on the cross to deliver us from the slavery of sin and death. We recognize that, through his wondrous sacrifice, we, too, became the People of God.

Can there be any greater reason for celebration?
