Chronology Of Eisenhower Illnesses

WASHINGTON (AP) — A chronology of former president Dwight D. Eisenhower's major illnesses:

Sept. 24, 1955—First heart attack, in Denver.

June 9, 1956—Surgery for an intestinal inflammation.

Nov. 26, 1957—Illness first described as a "chill," later diagnosed as a "small" stroke.

Nov. 9, 1965—Second heart attack, reported as "major," during vacation at Augusta National Golf Club, followed by a third seizure during recuperation.

Dec. 12, 1966—Surgery for gall bladder removal.

April 29, 1968—Fourth heart attack, at winter home in Palm Desert, Calif., listed as "mild."

June 15, 1968—Fifth heart attack, described as "major," at Walter Reed Army Hospital in late stage of recuperation from fourth attack.

Aug. 6, 1968—Sixth heart attack, a major one, suffered at Walter Reed the morning after he addressed the Republican National Convention by electronic hookup.

Aug. 16, 1968—Seventh heart attack, at Walter Reed, after physicians were encouraged enough about his recovery to stop issuing bulletins on his condition.

Aug. 17, 1968—Rapid irregular action of the heart developed and twice caused unconsciousness but electrical treatment was used and Eisenhower rallied. He remained in the hospital making gradual recovery.

Feb. 23, 1969—Doctors performed abdominal surgery to remove an intestinal obstruction threatening his life.

Feb. 28, 1969—Doctors report pneumonia in right lung.

March 15, 1969—Suffers congestive heart failure.

March 24, 1969—Suffers another episode of congestive heart failure.

March 28, 1969—Died.

OTTAWA (CP) — The United States embassy announced Friday that Canadians wishing to pay their respects to the late former president Eisenhower, may sign a book of condolence at the Embassy.

Doors of the Embassy will be open to visitors for their signatures today from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. EST and Monday to Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The American flag outside the Embassy on Wellington Street, across the road from Parliament Hill, was lowered to half-staff shortly after the announcement of Gen. Eisenhower's death Friday.
