ONLY (contod):

- 1. Maintenance of native language and culture.
- 2. Communication and involvement amongst all native youths in Ontario.
- 3. Recirrocation of good-will among Reserves and their surrounding non-Indian communities.
- 4. To make the Indian Public more aware of cultural centres and the literature written by and about Indian People.
- 5. To encourage constructive youth activity on Reserves so that they will develop as leaders in their own immediate communities.
- 6. To encourage the Indian Youth of Ontario to learn the culture of other tribes of Ontario by setting up exchange programs.

Attending the conference from Six Nations were Misses Sharon and Claudine VanEvery, Sandra McNaughton, Roberta Jamieson and Vera Hill. Miss Sharon VanEvery was alected President of the League.

They studied the white paper proposals and drafted a set of counter proposals.

The conference was sponsored by the Union of Ontario Indians, with a grant of \$6,000.

The next executive meeting of the League will be held at the Ontario Indian Centre in Toronto in October.

At the September meeting of the Six Nations Council a grant of \$1,500. was requested to help get the local Six Nations Chapter started.

COUNCIL ON RESERVE CRITICAL OF LACK OF POLICE RESPONSE:

Where are the police when you need them Six Nations band councillors want to know and Tuesday night they discussed setting up a constabulary of their own.

"People have called the police and there has been no response," Coun. Mrs. Rena Hill said. "Some of the officers who responded to the breakins (at the Ohsweken community centre) said they weren't getting paid to police the reserve."

Coun. William White suggested setting up a Six Nations constabulary so that Indians would not have to rely on non-Indians to police the reserve. "I think it's what we've got to do,"

Coun, White said a local police force could work on a part time basis. The native policemen would only have to work weekends he said because that is when most of the trouble occurs.

"Men hired and trained here may eventually be absorbed into the OPP, "he said.

Coun. Ronald Monture said the Caughnawaga reserve has a police force of its own that works satisfactorily. (contod)
