ST. PAUL ALBERTA - Canada's first Indian-administered school will come into being July 1, 1971 when the complete take-over of Blue Quill School adminsitration has been scheduled. The central-Alberta residential school has a roster of 200 students.

Persons interested in the problems of Canada's Indians might consider a recent summary from the United States. The U.S. Commissioner of Indian Affairs is an Indian, Louis R. Bruce from the St. Regis Reserve, Richfield Springs, N.Y. and 20 of the policy making jobs are held by Indians and white bureaucrats are being replaced by Indians as quickly as possible.
