Students Study Pollution of Grand River

David Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Anderson, R.R. 2 Ohsweken, was one of a group of nine Grade XII students in a five year science, technology and trades course at the Cayuga Technical High School, who have completed a three month pollution study of the Grand River from source to mouth.

The results were exhibited at the annual Hamilton Science Fair at McMaster University last Friday and Saturday.

The conclusion of the study was that a number of small dams along the Grand River could help the pollution abatement. The purpose of these dams would be to increase the speed of the water and thus increase the oxygen content of the water.

Oxygen content of water is related to its ability to support life. Large dams form reservoirs which stop the flow, whereas an abundance of small dams would increase the flow. By tests, the students found that the oxygen content was at its highest at Conestoga, near the river's source. It decreased to a low at Brantford where the river became sluggish and wide. Oxygen content rose below the Caledonia dam and dropped off at Dunnville where the river again became wide and slow. The study made the students more aware of what the river is.
