The students all return home in the summer. Students from the far north usually fail to get home for Christmas and Easter vacations because of weather and road conditions.

The school offers courses from Grades 1 to 8. "The school offers education to children who are unable to receive it because of social or physical reasons," said Donald Cassie, superintendent of the local branch of the Indian affairs department.

The social problems include broken homes and the physical causes concern areas where the population cannot support a school.

"The change will also allow us to fully utilize all of the residential educational facilities," said Mr. Cassie. "Presently some of the schools operate over the 100 per cent capacity, while others may have only 75 per cent enrolment."

We believe this is a step in the right direction and one which will see progress in education for Indian children.

There is a wonderful opportunity in these Indian residential schools to fit every student with a trade or a profession before graduation. Most residential schools are next door to Provincial High Schools and Technical Schools. Editor.
