An Old Indian Magazine

3 copies of an old magazine called The Indian Magazine, published in June 1895, August 1896, and January 1896 were read recently by your reporter. The magazine was published at Brantford by the hereditary chiefs council and was "A record of important events on the Six Mations Reservation."

It was a monthly magazine with a brown cover and at first it cost 35¢ per year but by 1896 the price had risen to the exorbitant price of 50¢ per year!

Some prices from the magazine showed lamps with burner, chimney and wick only 14¢, tumblers, fancy cut glass, 6 for 20¢, dish pans 10¢, 25 needles for 1¢.

Boys suits sold from \$1.25, men's suits from \$2.75. Indian root pills were 15¢ a box.
