The third year is spent refining skill training and completing leadership skills with orientation to responsibility to the community at large.

Instruction is given in six areas: millinery, dress-making, art, design for craftsmen, programming for fitness and designing leadership education programs.

Robert Wiele, co-ordinator of the regional course in Orillia, said emphasis is placed on personal growth and self development as a person as well as the teaching role.

Although the Provincial Institute has only been operated four years, regional programs have been offered by the department for 12 years.

R. S. Secord, director of the Youth and Education branch, attended the graduation ceremonies at Geneva Park.

Mrs. Lawrence Jonathan, from our own Six Nations Reserve, has just returned from Geneva Park where she received her second year training (skill and leadership). She attended a regional skill course at the O.A.C., Guelph, as a rug-hooking teacher in 1965. The following year she attended Kemptville O.A.C. for advanced instructors — working mainly in colour and design. In 1967 she began the sensitivity training at York University, Toronto, the first of the three year Provincial Leadership Training. For her second year, she was enrolled in the design for craftsmen for the skill part of the skill and leadership training.

May 29, 1969, a special meeting of Chiefswood Indian Village Committee was held, at the Six Nations Council House, to consider the request of the Six Nations Longhouse Singing Society to rent the Chiefswood Park for three days, August 2,3, & 4, 1969, to carry on a pow-wow, proceeds to be used for charity.

It was decided that the Chiefswood Indian Village Committee allow the Six Nations Longhouse Singing Society to make use of Chiefswood Park for a pow-wow, free of charge, provided that they clean up the grounds before and after the pow-wow.
