Service of Remembrance

On Sunday, November 16, members of the Six Nations and New Credit Reserves gathered to honour their war dead in colorful rites at the Cenotaph and Community Hall.

The veterans' parade formed up at the Community Hall in Ohsweken under parade master, Mr. Albert Montour. They were led by the Standard Bearers from legions of the surrounding districts and the Six Nations Salvation Army Corps Band for the initial service and laying of wreaths at the Cenotaph. Rev.
