## Hereditary Chiefs State Mohawk 'Revolt' Is Slated For Today

A delegation of Six Nations indian warriors announced in lamilton yesterday that starting today hereditary tribal hiefs are taking over governmental authority on the Brantial dimand reserve.

The GROUP of warriors, wearing tribal regalia, visited RCMP heaquarters here to give notice of the change. They are also sending a telegram of North America."

RESOLUTION TO vest authority in the old tribal chiefs and to appoint their own po-lice was taken recently at the tribal meeting in the Onondaga Longhouse.

The meeting was attended by over 1,000 Indians.
"Neither the Canadian government nor the RCMP have the right to interfere in our affairs," said Arthur Powless, affairs," said Arthuone of the warriors.

Irving Logan, another of the warriors, said that the decision to transfer authority to the old tribal chiefs was backed by most Six Nations Indians.

"WE HAVE THE support of the great majority," he said. The hereditary chiefs, back-ed by the warriors, claim that they have thousands of signatures on a petition to be sent to Ottawa asking that they be restored to the power they held before the Indian Act of 1924 instituted the elective system.
