## The Story Behind The Delaware United Church Organ (by N. M.)

When he grew up and went to work he was able to write names and read the newspaper. The Delaware Church was always uppermost in his mind, he often told of the times he ran beside his father on their way to church, he also knew right from wrong and a lot depended on how one lived in this world if you wanted to go to heaven. When he retired, the first thing he did was to take over the job of caretaker of the church, he bought many small things that the church needed, he paid a bulldozer man to level off the ground after the kitchen was finished, and finally his money bought the church organ.
