Diphtheria Warning

Dr. J. H. Nicholas, Medical Supt. at Lady Willingdon Hospital, has issued a statement urging Six Nations' parents to have their children immunized against the dread childhood disease of diphtheria. There is a current flare-up of the disease throughout Canada with two cases as near as Woodstock and the recent death of a child

from diphtheria in London, Ontario.

Parents should not be complacent about this highly-contagious disease. Better to be safe than sorry. Immunization shots may be obtained at Lady Willingdon Hospital.

We recall a death from diphtheria on the reserve about 1912 when Lynette Jewell Smith, only sister of Mr. Murray Smith, died from this dread disease. How often have we heard the anguished cry - "if only there was immunization then." Parents be warned.
