Dr. O's regalia sold at Glenhyrst

Ceremonial regalia of the I.O.F. was on display at the opening of the Glenhyrst Arts Council 10th annual antiques show and sale in Brantford in May.

Originally the property was that of Dr. Oronkyatekha, Mohawk Indian Chief born on the Six Nations Reserve. The black velvet cocked hat was topped with white Bird of Paradise feathers which folded neatly into a separate compact holder, the colorful gold braidtrimmed, blue and yellow sashes were complete with metal carrying cases. The carrying cases are mounted with brass plaques bearing the inscription "The Right Honorable Dr. Oronhyatekha".

Dr. O. (Pete Martin) was a member of the eminent Martin family which produced so many notable musicians. He attended Oxford University, England, and qualified as a physician and practised in London, Ont.

He was endowed with exceptional organizational ability and became associated with community work. He was a founder of the I.O.F. to which he later on in his life devoted his whole time. He became the Supreme Chief Ranger of the Order in 1894 and continued until his death in 1907. He may rightly be called a founder of the modern insurance business of today.

Recipe - Queen Elizabeth Cake - (This is easy and delicious, sent in by Bea Smith.)

4 Tosp. butter or shortening

1 Tsp. baking powder

I Cup white sugar

1 Egg

l½ Cup flour ½ Tsp. salt 1 Cup chopped dates

Put all these ingredients in a bowl and stir well.

l Tsp. baking soda in l cup of boiling water added to the above ingredients. Stir until well mixed.

Bake in a square or loaf pan. Bake about $\frac{1}{2}$ hour at 350°. It's good as is, but if desired put on this topping:

5 Tbsp. B. sugar - 2 Tsp. cream or milk - 3 Tbsp. butter Let come to a boil and add 2 cup cocoanut or chopped nuts.

<u>History of The Ojebvay Indians</u> Chapter 23 - Names of the "toodaims" And personal names (Written by SS based on P.J.)

The Ojebway nation is divided into several "toodaims" (tribes). Each (toodaim) is distinguished by a certain animal or thing such as: the eagle, reindeer, otter, bear, buffalo, beaver, catfish, pike, birch-bark, white oak tree, bear's liver. The Credit Indians are of the eagle "toodaim."

Originally the Ojebways gave but one name to their children. Here are some that were in common use: Nawahjegezhegumbe, m, the sloping sky. Pepoonahbay, m, the god of the north who makes winter. Manoonooding, m, the pleasant wind. Female names are male names, with the feminine terminations of quay or gooquay added thereto.
