
## Six Nations Council - Cont'd ....

job site; up until now there has been no inspection such as a pressure test. Mr. Lickers also questioned who is responsible for the purchase of the meter and water hydrant which will eventually be installed in the Arena; that it certainly must be adequate for the line. Councillor Syd Henhawk told Council the Arena Committee had been informed that at least a 4" line would be needed for insurance purposes and that the rates would drop if the fire hydrants were located closer to the Arena and Community Hall. He



said Bailey Construction had informed them that they could install a 6" line which would accomodate the hydrants. He said ook the Arena Committee would assume responsibility for the 6" line. Mr. Lickers told Council that they have an inspector for the sewers who is Mr. Walter Hunter but they do not have one for the water. He said that the water committee does have a qualified of person on the water committee who is Mr. John Johnson who works in that capacity for the Department of Transport but they do not feel that it is their responsibility to get the inspector. It was decided that Council would appoint

an inspector after one has been picked by the Arena Committee and approved by the Water-Sewer Committee.

Canon W.J. Zimmerman, former principal of the Mohawk Institute, attended the meeting at the invitation of the Council. He brought with him a record of the pupils who had attended the Mohawk Institute. The record book was dated 1865. Council thought the book might help to establish the ages of some of the elderly residents of the reserve who are eligible for old age pensions. He also brought four Anglican Prayer books written in the Mohawk and English languages. Councillor Nina Burnham asked if the books were presented to the Chapel or if they had been at the school. Canon Zimmerman told Council that as far as he knew the books had been published by The New England Company and had been in the school. He requested a letter of receipt in view of the fact that he does not know to whom the books, information and documents from the Mohawk Institute, belong. Mr. Keith Lickers told Council that during the process of rennovating the Mohawk Institute they were finding invaluable materials in cubbyholes on the third floor. He also said that a newspaper clipping had been found which stated that previously letters pertaining to Joseph Brant had been entrusted to Canen Zimmerman to keep until such time as a museum might be established. Canon Zimmerman told Council that he does not have any such letters and that there was no truth in the newspaper clipping. However he does have photostatic copies of some letters of Joseph Brant which he obtained from the National Archives in Ottawa. Council decided to acknowledge receipt of one record book and four prayer books to be left in custody of the Six Nations Council.

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
