

SIX NATIONS COUNCIL MEETING-TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 1973

Minutes of previous meetings October 30th and November 6th were adopted as read.

At Council meeting November 6th Council decided to request a breakdown of costs in the amount of \$5,000.00, from the township of Oneida. Council received the breakdown and decided to release the \$5,000. as their share of the cost of construction of the 5th line outlet.

Council decided to call Tenders up until 5:00 p.m., Monday, December 3, 1973 for the rental of the Glebe and Eagles Next Tract for a one year term.

Council had requested that Mr. D. J. Borton set up a meeting with Totten, Sims and Hubicki, in relation to the Village Streets. Mr. D. Borton, District Superintendent advised that he has set up a meeting for Wednesday, November 21, 1973, to discuss phase II of the construction of the village streets as phase I has been completed.

Council received a letter from the Kinsmen Club of Caledonia requesting that Six Nations enter a float in the Santa Claus Parade on Saturday, December 22nd in Caledonia. Council decided to acknowledge the letter and inform them that there would be no guarantee that Six Nations would enter a float due to the forthcoming elections.

Council received a letter from Caledonia Community Credit Union Limited, forwarded from the Co-ordinator of the AIAI, Mrs. Janice Garlow, that residents of the reserve who are attending Mohawk College, have been borrowing money to purchase cars and have been making only one or two payments and leaving the remainder. The letter asked for suggestions from Council. Council decided that there was nothing they could do and decided to acknowledge the letter and put it on file for further reference.

Council had requested a legal survey on lots 24 to 36, Concession 1 and 2, Tuscarora Township, but were informed by Mr. Norton Martin that this should read lots 25 to 36. The survey has been completed.

Council discussed the Six Nations School Committee and their regulations. Councillor Ross Powless questioned whether or not a school teacher could be a member of the school committee. Hugh Smith, Assistant to the Indian Superintendent, told Council that as far as he knows there is no regulation in the Indian Act prohibiting this. Councillor Powless stated he was quite sure that this was included in the committee's own regulations. Mr. Smith said that the members of the committee must be residents of the reserve but there is no regulation concerning their occupation. Councillor Wm. White told Council that the committee regulations were set up when each school had students from the immediate area and that Council should take into consideration that the students are now being bussed to different areas of the reserve. Also, that just about every school now has a home and school committee. Councillor Syd Henhawk told Council that they have been lax in appointing new members to the School Committee. Some have served longer than the three year term. Council decided to review the School Committee members.
