A recent survey by a leading educational authority brought out the fact that children learn more from home, church, clubs etc. than at school. This is not surprising since only 7 hours a day is spent at school and 17 is spent elsewhere. However, reading writing and arithmetic would not be learned nearly as well if there were no schools. Children like adults prefer not to think or work hard unless they have to. Most children learn things out of school from television. It is a great teaching medium. Through television the poorest child can travel to far off countries and see rare sights as well as the everyday sights so important to give children the right impression of foreign countries. Through television, children can visit airports, factories and mines. Science and Social Studies come alive through T.V. pictures. The boys and girls of New Credit now can share in the educational riches that T.V. has to offer. Already Gr. 5 & 6 have seen several educational programs in Social Studies while Gr. 3 & 4 have had T.V. reading lessons and have seen an airport.

The T.V. is being bought and paid for by the New Credit pupils themselves. They have already raised over \$30.00 through a draw, a hot-dog sale and a school store. The money from the school Christmas concert was used as a down payment. Educational T.V. teaching is becoming more and more common in rich city schools, and New Credit school is one country school which does not want to be left behind. Some day T.V. will be as common in all schools as as pencils and books are today. Can anyone remember when boys and girls used slates instead of paper and pencil? Would anyone like their children to be taught like that today?
