This is a hell of a way to do business; but if that Saponi-Tutelo memo of 3/19/44 has any value it would be in fixing their presence in the U.S. after they are supposed to have moved to Canada &, perhaps, locating them. The notes from which I made the 3/19 memo were hastily made; didn't realize till I got home that they dont add up. I ,therefore, stopped again at N.Y.Historical Society library 3/23 & recheaked. The following is, I believe, accurate; and , what's more, it throws considerable additional light.

## SAPONI-TUTELO AMONG THE IROQUOIS: 1792

I stopped last week at the New York Historical Society place (170 Central Park W., MYC) to take a look at the Israel Chapin papers in the O'Reilly Collection, about which Vail at Albany told as some years ago. He spelled his name Henry O'Rielly when he gave this big bunch of stuff to the Society in 1860; but the Society catalogues it as Henry O'Reilly Collection. Amongst a lot of other staff there are 15 bound scrap-books titled "Western Mementoes:1774-1820" in which are pasted original MSS or official copies thereof, and a great deal of material copied from American State Papers and like sources presumably by O'Reilly himself. The arrangement is not, as the Jociety's catalogue says, chronological. There may be a system to it but I had no time to discover it. It went thru Tol.s. 6, 7 & 8 of the Western Mementoes series, and there alone I found enough good stuff to choke a horse: Many of the original Phelps and Gorham letters, agreements with "hapin and others who went out to Canan aigua for them, instructions especially from Phelps as to how to handle the Indians; what appear to me to be original copies of treaties and agreements; many letters from Samuel Kirkland (apparently the originals); hapin's accounts with the War Department, including the "Secret Serive accounts"; letters of instruction to him from Knox, Pickering et al; letters from Brant and the various spies which the Americans had located hereabouts; THE PERSON NAMED IN atc. etc..

There are two papers in Chapin's hand pasted to the same page in vol. 2. One (I) is a small scrap, about 3" x 5"; the other is a sheet about Smio (II).

III. In the same vol.8 there is a MS copy of "Speech of Captain Jacob Chief of the SUPEONEA NATION with a number of warriors of that nation, made to Israel Chapin at Canandargay this 27th day of July, 1792".

I did not copy it, but Jacobs says, in effect, "here are some wampum belts to be sent to the United States with our good wishes; we have not thought it necessary before to attend any council, but we now hear they have land "in the State of Pennsylvania which the State are ready to pay us for" and we'd like to have the money."

- A. In Br.Mus. Add MSS 12660, Library of Congress photostats there is a letter of 11/11/1778 from Capt. Walter Butler to Bolton reporting on the Cherry Valley Massacre in which he says Brant and CAPT. JACOBS of OCHQUAGA did they best they could to help him hold the Indians in check.
- B. Col. Guy Johnson's "Return of Refugees at Ft.Niagara: May 13, 1781" (Canadian Archives photostat) mentions amongst those sent "to plant at Buffaloe Creek" a party of PODERIGHRONOS, CAYUGA & NANTICOKE" (refugees from "Chughquagy") under PEKARACHKA as head man.
- C. The Kirkland Census of Oct.20,1789 (Hamilton College MS) enumerates about 65 "TEDDEOGHRONES at Buffaloe Creek"; and amongst the Cayuga family heads at Buffalo Creek he names PAGHREAHGRON, "broken axe" (Snipe Clan).
- D. July 27,1792, CAPT. JACOBS spoke for the SUPEONEA (Suponea)
  NATION to Chapin, and indicates in his speech that his nation
  had not thought it necessary to attend any of the previous councils
  (altho Handbk under Saponi says from a treaty made with the Cayuga
  at Albany in 1780 "it appears that a remnant still lived with this
  tribe on Seneca river, in Seneca Co., NY; after which they disappear
  from history").
- E. There are many instances were the names <u>Tutelo-Saponi</u> are used interchangeably. One clear case is in Penna. Col.Records, v.3, p.511 where they are referred to as "Tootelaes alias Chaponick".
- F. Why Chapin lists them separately in (I) above & not in (II), I do not know; except that the second Census is probably more accurately made than the first and its purpose is shown by the final line. The other may have been merely a rough figure for Pickering who was at the time in Phila, shortly before starting west to meet the western Indians at Augdaize. He was at the time "consulting expert" on these indians for known and Washington, since he had come thru two treaties with them (Tioga Point, and Newtown Point (usually called Painted Post). The biggest differences are in the figures for Cayuga at Buffalo Cr. It is possible that they left for Grand River between the times the two papers were made, and took the Saponi with them.
  - G. According to Hale's Tutelo informant, when the Tutelo fled to Canada shortly after 1779 they parted with the Saponi at Niagara.
