OTTAWA - Canada's largest labour union, Unifor, welcomed Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's proposed repel of anti-labour bills C-525 and C-377. These two bills were put in place by the previous federal Conservatives under former PM, Stephen Harper.

The bills were called under scrutiny for "undermining the charter right to form a union for workers in federally regulated sectors while imposing unnecessary and onerous reporting burdens on all unions," according to **Unifor National Pres**ident Jerry Dias. "The union movement worked diligently to repeal these undemocratic and unjust hills."
