Work on Reserves Aided For Indians (Brantford Expositor May 16)

Indians must be given a chance to work on reserves, Mrs. Ethel Brant Monture told delegates to the Indian Conference Wednesday at Toronto.

Mrs. Monture, an Indian and author speaking at the conference sponsored by the Canadian Council for Christians and Jews and attended by 30 Indian women from 15 Quebec and Ontario reserves, said she deplored the Indian brain drain to cities. She is a resident of Onondaga Township near Chalfontwood.

She said the IOWE was considered a business course for Indian girls who come to the city looking for jobs.

"But we must have it on the reserve, not in the city," she said.

Mrs. Monture urged Indians to stand up and say what they want. She expressed her dislike for programs arranged by outside groups which were made without the knowledge or co-operation of those on the reserve.

The Indian mothers said the Hippie movement had affected youths on reserves as well as those in cities.

The most frequently mentioned problems were school dropouts and smoking and drinking by minors.

Regarding the last problem of drinking by minors - parents must wake up to this evil and demand that those supplying liquor to minors be prosecuted the same as in a white community. W.S.

Indians Told To Agitate (Brantford Expositor, May 18, 1968)

Indians must lobby for their needs even at the expense of being branded agitators, a Six Nations Indian said Friday.

James Powless, employed by the federal government as assistant superintendent of the Peterborough agency, told the closing session of a three-day meeting of Indian women at Toronto that Indians tend to be reticent because they are afraid of being branded as agitators.

The meeting was organized by The Canadian Council of Christians and Jews.

Chief Burton Jacobs of Waipole Island said Indians must try to improve their relations with white people.

He said some Indians still harbor hatred towards whites because of broken treaties which left the Indian filled with apathy, distrust and despair.

Mr. Jacobs also said Indians have failed to take full advantage of available grants.

A meeting of the Indian Advisory is being held in the Ohsweken Community Hall on Wednesday. The Six Nations Council have been invited and the meeting is open to the public.

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
