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**Synopsis of Proposed By-Law Number 162 of the Town of Timmins TO BE VOTED ON at the Municipal Election on the 10th Day of January 1921.**

For borrowing the sum of eleven thousand one hundred (\$11,100.00) dollars for the purpose of acquiring certain lands in the Township of Tisdale and erecting thereon an Incinerator Plant for the disposal of garbage and other refuse. The total costs of the lands and plant to be approximately seventeen thousand seven hundred (\$17,700.00) dollars to be acquired and constructed jointly by the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Timmins and the Municipal Corporation of the Township of Tisdale. The cost to be borne: Forty (40%) per cent. by Tisdale. Sixty (60%) per cent. by Timmins. The cost of operating the first year to be apportioned at the same rate and the cost of operating in subsequent years to be apportioned on the bases of the tonnage of garbage etc., disposed of by the said plant from the respective Municipalities. The Incinerator Plant to be managed by a committee of three (3) one appointed from each Council, the third for the first year appointed from the Timmins Council and for ensuing years from each Council alternately. The said moneys shall be payable in ten (10) equal annual instalments of principal and interest of fifteen hundred and eighty dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$1,580.39) each.

**POLICE CHIEF RESIGNS TO RETURN TO MINING.**  
(Continued from page 1)

Timmins, referring to the large attendance at the clinics for children and mothers and to the general interest taken in the work of the nurses, Miss Linton and Miss Meiklejohn. Their inspection of the homes and their visits to mothers and children had been of great value. At the clinics also the results had been very helpful to the general public health and welfare. Mothers had learned of physical imperfections or diseases in their children, easily remedied now in most cases but that would be serious, if allowed to go unchecked. Attention had been called to many cases of enlarged tonsils, adenoids and other nose and throat troubles. In most cases the nurses had been very well received. People in general seemed to be very glad to receive their expert advice and assistance. Dr. Moore said he felt that the value of their work was now apparent and of the greatest benefit to the town. In October the Council had asked for a definite proposition. The proposition was now before them, —to engage a nurse for the Town through the Provincial Board of Health, the cost to be approximately from \$150 to \$200 per month. The Mayor endorsed the good work of the nurses, and thought it had been of very great benefit to the Town. He suggested that had there been such a nurse here during the past three years the lives of several children might have been saved. Dr. George, Provincial Medical Health Officer, said the Mayor had touched the keynote of the situation, —the saving of lives through care and attention to health matters. The war had shown that 60 per cent. of the male population of military age was unfit for military service, and there was no reason for believing that the female population in better health. It was shown that 60 per cent. of the defects could have been corrected if known and treated during school age, and 60 per cent. of the remainder could have been remedied before school age. Dr. George went on to show how attention to small children improved the general public health while expert advice and assistance to mothers and prospective mothers would materially lessen the death rate among women and children. On motion of Councillors Longmore and DeFeu, it was decided to authorize the local Board of Health to secure a nurse for the Town through the Provincial Board of Health, the salary for the nurse to be \$175.00 per month, and the co-operation of the Public and Separate School Boards being secured to make the best use of her services. The usual by-law disqualifying from voting at municipal elections those in arrears of taxes on Dec. 14, was given its required readings and duly passed. The by-law regarding the borrowing of \$11,100 for Timmins' part of the price of the joint incinerator for the Town and Tisdale was read and passed ready for submission to the ratepayers at the municipal election in January. The by-law regarding the agreement with the Township and the Incinerator Co. was also duly passed. The matter of the appointment of a local Fuel Control Board, as suggested by the Provincial Fuel Controller, was dealt with. In this connection Councillor Longmore said that he thought the local coal dealers had all been unusually considerate of the people in general in their handling of the fuel problems during the past three years, and this was endorsed by the others present. On motion Fire Chief Borland, Mayor McInnis and Councillor DeFeu were appointed as the Fuel Control Board for the Town of Timmins. Town Solicitor D. W. O'Sullivan gave a summary of the proceedings in the case of White vs the Town of Timmins, together with a statement of his fees and costs in the case. On motion of Councillor Laprairie and De Feu, the account of Mr. O'Sullivan for \$209.23 for expenses, etc., in the White case was ordered paid. Mr. O'Sullivan's report on the case, White vs Town of Timmins is published in full elsewhere in this issue.

Division Court was held in the Council Chamber on Thursday last after the police court session was over. The police court last week only took about five minutes, there being no cases of any importance tried.

**TIMMINS THE HEALTHIEST TOWN IN THE NORTH LAND.**

Touch wood! There is an old superstition that when a man boasts of his good health or his good luck, he should immediately "touch wood" after the statement, touching wood having the effect of diverting the attention of the imps who might hear the boast and so be tempted by their malicious natures to change the health or the luck of the speaker just to have a joke on him after his boast. Following the superstition The Nugget always places both hands on its head after repeating the rhyme that says that "Cobalt is the best old town I know." In referring to the health of Timmins it may be necessary to "touch wood" because the luck of Timmins in the matter of health is certainly desired to be continued. From the commencement of the town until the present time, Timmins had rare luck both in the matter of health and of fires. Touch wood. This luck has been made by various causes. —The situation of the town, the type of its people, the care of the authorities, and the general safeguards and preventatives adopted from time to time. Practically every other centre in the North Land, at some time or another has suffered seriously through fire or general illness. But Timmins has been comparatively free from these evils. Touch wood! Cobalt's epidemic of typhoid fever will always be remembered in the North Land. Timmins could count all the cases of typhoid ever in the town on the fingers of two hands. For several years past not a single case of typhoid has been reported here. At the present time there is an epidemic of typhoid at South Temiskaming among the men employed at the plant being erected there for the Kipawa Company. The disease is apparently not of virulent type, but there are said to be 150 cases, most of those affected being sent to the various hospitals in the district. They are several now at Haileybury hospital. Haileybury at present has a number of diphtheria cases. North Bay has several smallpox cases, and the vaccination of all school children is urged there to prevent further cases. In smallpox, diphtheria and other contagious diseases, Timmins has a remarkably good record. Touch wood. Even in the Flu epidemic Timmins had a record equal to the more fortunate towns. Touch wood. Taken all through Timmins has a very creditable and pleasing record as a healthy town. Will some one please pat The Nugget

**SEVERAL TYPHOID FEVER CASES AT SMOOTH ROCK.**

There are a number of typhoid fever cases reported from Smooth Rock Falls, most of the patients now making satisfactory progress to recovery. The authorities made every possible effort to prevent any spread of the disease and despite the many difficulties very effective efforts were made along this line. A couple of deaths are reported as occurring before the disease could be coped with, but no further new cases seem to be developing and the few now ill are making good progress to recovery.

**TWO MORE COMPANIES WORKING IN KEAD TP.**

Two more companies are now at work in Skead Township. These new companies have been organized by E. W. Grant, of St. Paul, Minnesota. They have taken over the working of groups of claims south of the Crawford Skead Gold Mines Company. New camp buildings are being completed and arrangements made for extended work this winter. Special interest will be taken in Skead on account of the recently reported strike at the Crawford-Skead. A find of good high grade was made in the shaft about 12 feet down. The vein is about four feet wide. A small plant is being put in on the Crawford-Skead. George J. Fielder is the new president of the Crawford-Skead and in company with some of the directors Mr. Fielder was a recent visitor to the property. They were well pleased with their visit and have great hopes for the property.

The death occurred on Thursday last of Mr. L. T. Miller, father of Mr. Frank Miller of the Dome. The late Mr. Miller had been in poor health for some time past. He was 65 years at the time of death. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. W. J. Arms, and interment was made in Tisdale cemetery on Saturday, many friends being present at the last sad rites. The late Mr. Miller was highly esteemed in the community and sincere sympathy goes out to Mr. Frank Miller and the other near relatives and friends in their bereavement.

The late Mr. Osborne was 31 years of age and leaves a widow and several children in England. He had intended to bring his family to Canada in the course of two or three months.

**THE TWO DAVIDSONS TO RESUME WORK SHORTLY.**

Current reports from South Porcupine are to the effect that both the Davidson and the North Davidson mines will resume work in the very near future. South End people count on this as a help to their town. It is expected that the North Davidson will resume work in a few days, while the Davidson Consolidated will be under full swing again sometime in January. The Davidson Consolidated are said to be planning a big development programme which will include the sinking of the shaft to a considerable depth. Values at depth are said to be unusually promising and advantage is expected to be taken of this feature. At the North Davidson the programme planned is also a noteworthy one, including shaft sinking, drifting, cross-cutting, etc. With the promise of these two mines in early operation and with other mining properties in the district likely to be re-opened and the Dome speeding up, South End thinks the outlook is considerably brightened up.

It is understood that the Fesserton Lumber Co., has been granted three townships, Thornloe, McKeown, and Reynolds, in the recent sale of timber limits, the tenders being opened on Nov. 20th. Not much time lost in this case, if the report is true.
