Early in the new year it is expected that arrangements will be made for the re-opening of the Shelter at Hai leybury and the Society will again be in a position to take up the care of deserving children as before. On account of lack of finances the Shelter Toronto, November 15th., 1920. -51. had to be closed for a time this year, but the Government has assisted with

a grant of \$3000.

The Secretary's report reviewed the work for the year and contained this paragraph of particular interest locally;--"I am pleased to announce that a number of gentlemen in Timmins are taking steps towards the formation of a branch of the Society in the Northern part of the district. This is a most important move and has become necessary as growth in population in that section makes it imperative that closer supervision of children be supplied." There is also a spec ial not of thanks to the Masonic and Oddfellows Lodges of the district, to Magistrate Atkinson and to the Red Cross Society of Schumacher and others for kindnesses shown the Society. Forty-one children were cared for in the Shelter during the year the average per month being 12. Two of the 41 children came from Timmins, three from Tisdale, 5 from Cochrane and the rest from the southern part of the district.

Satur day evening, according to the evidence of the case as given to the police, Folker stopped to admire a pair of moccasins hanging in front of Shaheen's store. He formed a great attachment for the moccasins, with the result that they walked away with him. Mr. Shaheen noticed the moccasins going, or gone, and took after them. The police officers were at the Imperial Bank corner and they joined in the chase. Folker had gone down the lane at the side of the building, but just got as far as the rear of the build ing when he was overtaken and stopped. The moccasins were found in a barrel or box in the lane where they had been thrown or dropped. "How did you know the moccasins would fit you?'' Chief Greer asked Folker. "Oh, I know they were my size all right; I had looked at them long enough," was the reply.

The Workmen's Central Council at Cobalt has reported the result of the vote of the men in regard to having Sick Benefit Fund established for employees of the various mines. mines did not report a vote, these being the O'Brien and the Beaver. The other mine employees voted 737 for adopting a Sick Benefit Scheme and 134 against, nearly 85 per cent. of the 871 votes cast thus being in favour of the plan.
