BROWN NOW ON EXTENDED
DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME.

The Northerown Mines, more commonly known as the Porcupine Crown simply the Crown, has not closed down nor has it any intention of closing down as reported. Instead, the Crown is going after its development programme with a vim and extended work is to be carried on. The big programme of development work rapped out some time ago could not be carried out as the management would have liked to have it done during the past year, but now full attention may be centered on it and great progress made during the next two or three months. On account of the power situation it has been found expedient to close the mill, but this will not prove any particular handicap to the Northerown in the long run. The extended programme of underground development will mean of course an added amount of work for the mill, but the mill has a capacity that can be used to advantage with ore ahead. The plan of the management is to do as much development work as possible now and then when the power is available again to simply speed up the mill and run the ore through. With the development work now under way and the doubling up of the mill staffs in the spring, the production of the Northerown will undoubtedly make a record in the next six months.

YOUR CHILD'S TEACHER.

Do you know your child's teacher? Have you ever called on her to discuss the human being for whom you and she are jointly responsible? She is your child's best friend, outside the home. She is your partner in the business of bringing the child up to worthy citizenship. Your interest in this business is far greater than hers. She is always an active, tireless partner; but too many parents are silent ones.

The teacher is deserving of the confidence the parent places in her, but it is fair that she should be obliged to bear the whole responsibility for the education of the child.

It is the duty of the parent to confer frequently with the child's teacher just as a conscientious business man confers often with his partners on the condition of the business.

The teacher should be cultivated as a strong, personal friend with whom the parent shares the most congenial of common interests.

She should be visited at least once a month and consulted as to the child's weaknesses and the methods whereby the parent can best co-operate in the work of the teachers. The good school and the good teacher welcome the co-operation of the helpful parent but there is a difference between the helpful parent and the merely critical one.

If you are not yet acquainted with your child's teacher, suppose you call on her and get acquainted; and have a long talk about your child. You will learn much from her; and she will learn much from you; and then both of you will know the child better.

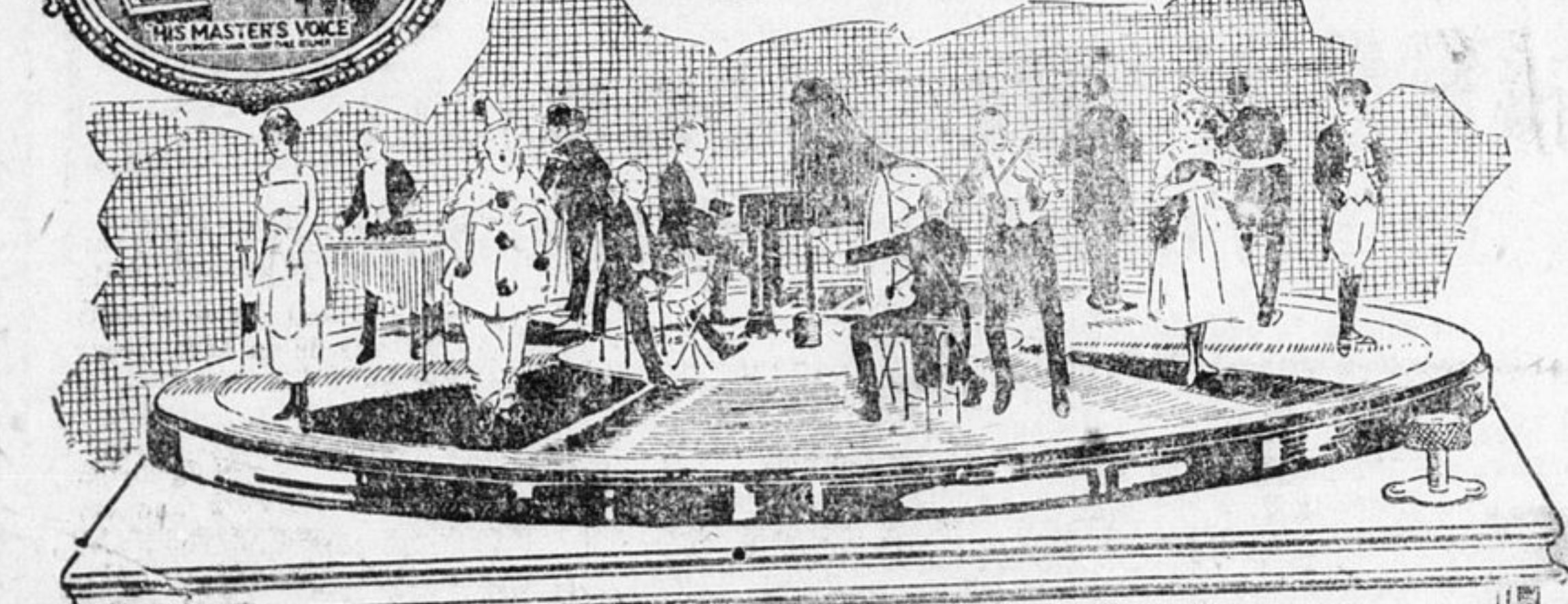
