**FATAL ACCIDENT ON
T. & N. O. AT ENGLEHART**

Last week an accident occurred in the Englehart yards of the T. & N. O. Ry which two brakemen, Messrs Turner and Clark of the main line crews, suffered serious injuries. Clark is making good progress to recovery at the hospital, but Turner, died after 4 hours. Brakeman Turner was thrown beneath the wheels of a train that was backing up. Both his legs were badly mangled by the wheels and he did not recover from the shock and loss of blood. His home is in Englehart and he had no immediate relatives in this country.

**IROQUOIS FALLS WINS
TWO MORE N. O. H. A. GAMES.**

Iroquois Falls is showing good form in hockey. Friday night they won from New Liskeard on Liskeard ice by the score of 4 to 2. According to reports received here they won by a better brand of hockey. Corbould in goal was the star for the Falls, with Brydge, Joliat and Boucher playing especially effective games. Liskeard's line-up included C. Montgomery in goal, with R. Montgomery starring at centre. In the third period Iroquois Falls adopted defensive tactics and Liskeard did the rushing. Just before the end, however, the visitors showed that they were not played out by a hurt and the scoring of an extra goal making it 4 to 2.

The Falls won again from Haileybury on Monday evening, the score being 5 to 2. At the end of the first period the score was 1-1, at the end of the second 2-1 in favor of Haileybury, but in the last period the Falls lay rushes and combination work and the most strenuous kind of good hockey, got the lead of three goals. It was a game they earned in every way. For both games the officials were Mr. Stoddard of North Bay and Mr. A. Jewell, of New Liskeard the latter acting as judge of play at Liskeard and referee at Haileybury.

This may be supposed to be a "dry" country, but just look at the hockey line-up at the recent Liskeard-Porcupine game. On the Porcupine team there were:—George Worters, a refreshing Spring and a long Lake, while the Liskeard team had the Scotch of it, they had little Burns playing gently over the ice.

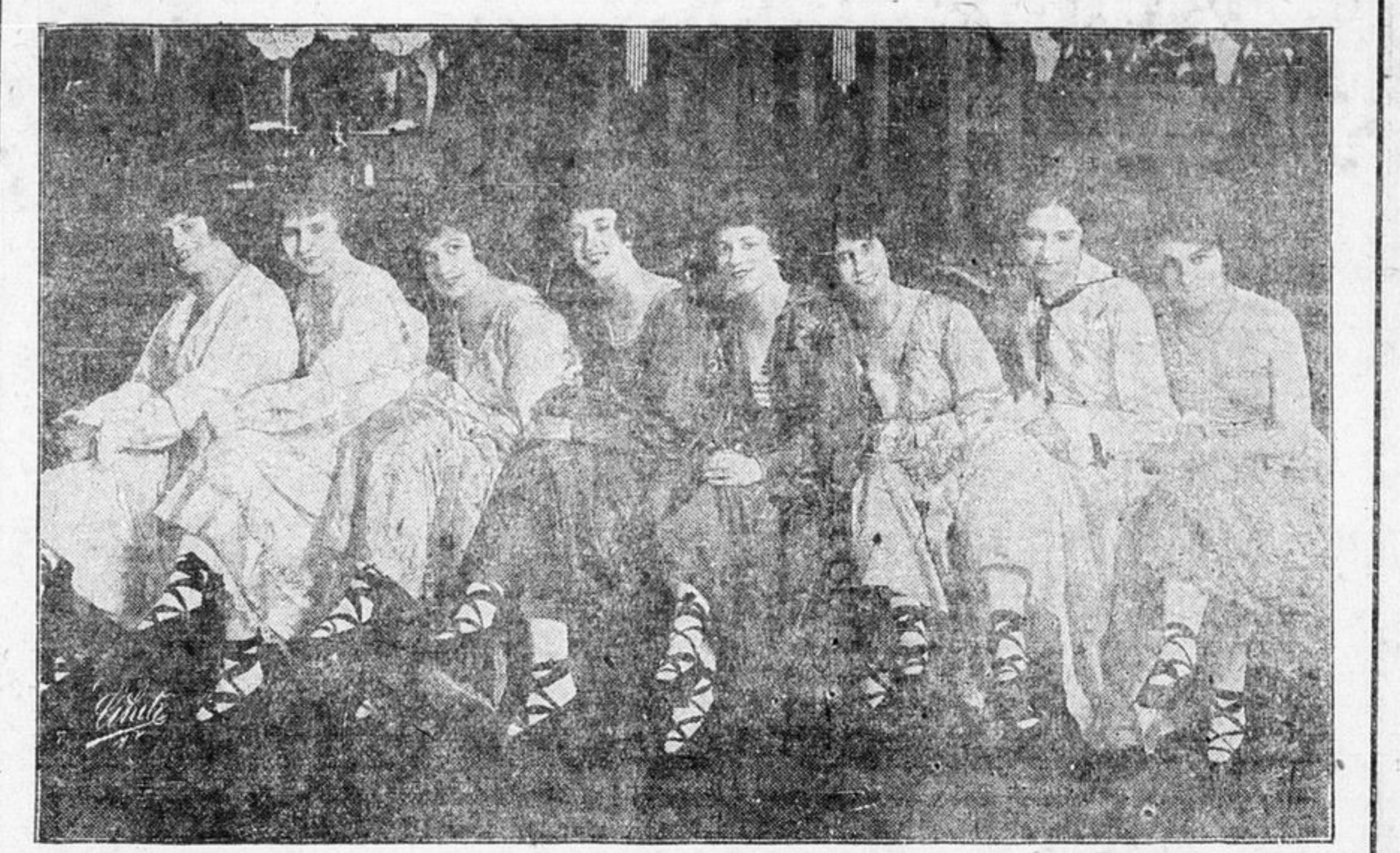
