The remains were laid to rest at Oshawa, Ont., on Feb. 19th. Much sympathy is felt for Mrs. Henry in her sad bereavement.

A general meeting of the Children's Aid Society of Porcupine will be held in the Council Chamber, Timmins, on Thursday (tomorrow) evening, at 8 p.m. The meeting's business will include the reading and consideration of the by-laws, etc., for the new society.

Mr. J. W. Wray returned this week from a few weeks spent at his home in Galt. He was unaccompanied and suggests that if there is any truth at all in the recent report of the double wedding in Galt then Herb must be bringing back the two brides when he comes.

About 11 o'clock Monday morning a phone message called the fire brigade to the Queen's Cafe building at the corner of Pine Street and Second Avenue, opposite the old Bank Saloon. When the brigade reached the place they found the Fire Chief at work. He had noticed the chimney fire while up street and had at once investigated while some one else, seeing the sparks and smoke, had phoned an alarm. The blaze had gotten into some wooden partitions and might have made a bad fire if undiscovered. Prompt action, however, removed all danger. The fire was extinguished by the use of the hand chemical extinguishers, and practically no damage was caused by the little blaze.
