ELIMINATION GAMES FOR
THE FAMOUS ALLAN CUP.

The following is from The Toronto
Star of recent date and will be of
general interest to the hockey fans in
this Camp:—

There will be three Allan Cup elimi-
nation games at the Arena next week
—on Tuesday, Thursday and Satur-
day. The games are as follows:—
Tuesday—Canadian Soo (N.O.H.A.
champions) vs. Galt (intermediate
O.H.A. champions). Sudden-death
game.

Thursday—Winner of Tuesday's
game vs. University of Toronto (sen-
ior O.H.A. champions).

Saturday—Winner of Tuesday's
game vs. University of Toronto. Total
goals in two games to count.

The Soo team arrived in the city
last night and practised at the Arena
to-day. They are in charge of George
McNamara, their coach. There are 12
players in the party, as follows:—

James ("Flat") Walsh—Goal—
Learned the game in Kingston and is
well known throughout Ontario as
one of the best goal-tenders in the
game; age 24; weight 160.

James ("Babe") Donnelly.—De-
fence—A Soo boy; played his first sen-
ior hockey in the Soo in 1915; play-
ed with 227th Battalion in 1916-1917,
and with Edmonton Eskimos on his
return from overseas; rated as clever-
est defence man in the west last year;
age 24; weight 165.

Alvin Fisher—Defence—A Soo boy,
started season at left wing, but was
moved back to defence; has played
considerably in Hamilton; very fast,
and a clever stick-handler; playing
the best game of his career this sea-
son; age 27; weight 165.

Bill Phillips, Centre—Born in Lon-
don, Ont., but moved to Thessalon a
few years ago; played with Western
Ontario All-Star O.H.A.; with Soo
last year; clever back-checker; age 23
weight 145.

Bill Cook, Right wing—played with
Kingston Frontenacs last year in in-
termediate O.H.A. finals; a fast, ag-
gressive player, always on the job;
age 24; weight 175.

Roy Lessard, Left wing—A Soo
boy; played with 228th Battalion ju-
niors in 1916-1917, and with the Soo
last year; fast and clever; a goal-get-
ter; age 24; weight 145.

"Vic" Desjardines, A Soo boy; the
speed boy of the team; played with
Soo, Michigan, last year, and was
rated as one of the best centre men in
the A.A.H.A.; another goal-getter;

Gerald Munro, A Soo boy; played
age 23; weight 135.

as a comer; plays both defence and
forward; age 23; weight 165.

M. Fisher.—A Soo boy; brother of
Alvin; played defence with Soo last
year, and has been used considerably
this season; age 24; weight 160.

John Drury—A Soo boy; played
with Soo last year; age 25; weight
148.

Nichols—A Soo boy; played con-
siderable hockey with Soo; subbed as
goal-tender last year; age 22; weight
170.

ENFORCING QUARANTINE
IN UNORGANIZED PLACES

Last week Dr. George, District
Medical Health Officer, of North Bay,
was called to Englehart to enforce
quarantine for smallpox in the settle-
ments east of Englehart. In the un-
organized district around what is
generally called Tomston there are
several cases, some in Ingram and
Evanurel Townships, but none of
them serious. In all there will be
some 15 or 20 cases. A couple of
weeks ago Dr. George visited the dis-
trict, and since then he has been in-
formed that quarantine was not being
respected, so the trip was made last
week to ensure a proper observance
of quarantine as a measure of pro-
tection to the public and a general
method of checking the spread of the
disease.

SUDEBURY MAKES STRONG
PROTEST RE TAX INCREASE

At a meeting or representative busi-
ness, professional and mining at Sud-
bury last week a strong resolution of
protest against the proposed increas-
ed mining tax of the Drury Govern-
ment was unanimously adopted, and
has been telegraphed to the Premier
and to Hon. Harry Mills, Minister of
Mines. The following is the resolu-
tion as sent:—

"In the opinion of the citizens of
Sudbury and adjacent mining towns
the proposal to increase the tax on
profits of mining companies is inop-
portune and unjust, and would tend
to discourage the investment of out-
side capital and retard the develop-
ment of our mineral resources, and
we emphatically protest against any
further increase of tax."
