PORCUPINE GOLD OVER TEN MILLIONS IN 1920

Over 60 per cent. of This From the Hollinger, McIntyre and Dome Also Big Producers and Kirkland Lake Coming Along Fine.

The report of the Ontario Department of Mines of the mineral production of the Province for 1920 makes interesting reading. In this Camp the chief interest in the report will centre naturally in what is said regarding the gold production.

According to the table published in the report there were 1,258,232 tons of gold ore milled in the Province, the total value of the gold produced being \$11,659,929.43. Of this amount, the Porcupine mines produced \$10,577,572.52 or over ninety per cent. The Kirkland Lake mines produced \$1,033,478.29. The three smaller mines in Ontario (The Argonaut, the Contact Bay and the W. E. Stone) had \$28,878.62 to their credit.

In the Porcupine Camp the big producer was the Hollinger, with a total of 650,205 tons milled, the value being \$6,164,264.92.

Next came the McIntyre-Porcupine with a total of 191,032 tons and a value of \$2,202,100.50.

The Dome came next to the Hollinger in tonnage but next to the McIntyre in value, the tons milled at the Dome being 295,220 tons of a value of \$2,005,640.87.

Among the smaller mines of the Porcupine the Northerown has the better showing both in tonnage and value, the figures being 11,678 tons at \$96,584.37. To this may be added the figures for the Porcupine Crown Mines, 6,220 tons at \$70,962.46, making a total of 17,898 tons milled of a value of \$167,546.83. The Northerown Porcupine Mines is the amalgamation of the Porcupine Crown and the Thompson-Krist. The property was operated until last May as the Porcupine Crown.

Next in the list is the Dome Lake Mining and Milling Co. with 4,707 tons milled of a value of \$46,809.11.

The Davidson Consolidated contributed the balance of Porcupine's gold production, some 3000 tons of a gross value of \$11,210.29.

Of the \$1,033,478.29 produced by Kirkland Lake, the Lake Shore led with 19,779 tons milled, value \$502,113.34. The Teek Hughes and Kirkland Lake exceeded the Lake Shore, however, in tonnage milled, though they had not such high-grade ore passing through their mills. The Kirkland Lake production was 40,812 tons worth \$285,170.67, and the Teek-Hughes 30,646 tons at \$246,194.28.

It will be noted that the average grade of the production for Ontario runs close to \$10.00 per ton.

During 1920 the gold mines of Ontario had many difficulties to contend with and it speaks volumes for the ability and enterprise of the managements of the various mines that there were such good showings for the year.

In commenting on the general situation the report of the Ontario Dept. of Mines says:—

For some years prior to 1903 the output of gold exceeded that of silver. This position was reversed in 1904 when the silver mines of Cobalt began to produce. The pendulum has swung back again, and Ontario's gold production for 1920 exceeds that of silver. Despite labor scarcity and high operating costs for the first nine months of the year, followed by a shortage of Hydro-Electric power during the last quarter, the yield of Ontario's gold mines was the largest in history of the Province. The climb upward began with the discovery of Porcupine in 1909. Canada in 1919, owing to Ontario's contribution, was the only country in the world to show an increased output of gold. So far as known this same statement applies for 1920 Porcupine and Kirkland Lake are now recognized as important gold camps. The Davidson and Dome Lake Mines at Porcupine were closed at the end of the year.

The recently issued geological report on Kirkland Lake, by A. G. Burrows and P. E. Hopkins, will do much to enlighten the public regarding the extent and possibilities of this gold area. The Wright-Hargreaves 150-ton mill is complete, and ready to operate in the spring when electric power is available. A start has been made on the mill by the Ontario Kirkland. Developments in Lebel township, east of Kirkland Lake, are promising.

Among the special features to welcome the many visitors in town last week were special window displays by local stores. In this connection the windows of the Hollinger Stores and of the Curtis Drug Co., were specially worth mention, being original and specially appropriate for the occasion.

DOG BY-LAW HEREAFTER TO BE STRICTLY ENFORCED

As noted in the last issue of The Advance it is the intention of the authorities to strictly enforce the provisions of the Town By-law regarding dogs. It is felt that there have been too many dogs around, running out of control and doing a certain amount of injury and creating much annoyance. Further Chief Greer believes that a strict observance of the Dog By-law will do away with practically all of the trouble, so the by-law is to be strictly enforced. This week notices have been posted giving all dog-owners due warning that on and after Monday next, March 14th, any dogs found running at large in this municipality will be put in pound and owners will be prosecuted under the by-law. In cases where dogs are impounded and no owners can be found for them, the dogs will be destroyed after 48 hours. Of course, these provisions do not in any way relieve owners of dogs of securing licenses, nor does the holding of licenses release the owners from seeing that the other provisions of the by-law are observed. Any dog without the necessary tag is liable to be impounded on sight and the lack of the tag may make it impossible for the owner to be located. If the dog has a tag, it is a simple matter for the police to learn the owner's name from their records. Special attention this year is called to the provision in the by-law that no dog, tagged or otherwise, can run at large. Every dog on street must be closely and directly under the control of his owner or some adult person.

The many friends here of the late Wilfrid Schiedel, one of the shift bosses at the Hollinger, who passed away while asleep in the bunk house of the Hollinger on Friday, Feb. 4th will read with interest the following from a recent issue of The Daily Record of Kitchener, Ontario:—

We desire to convey to you and Mrs. Schiedel the assurance of our high esteem, and in tendering our heartfelt sympathy we commend you to that higher than human source of consolation which alone can bring peace to the wounded heart when death removes our loved ones from their accustomed place.

PROSPECTS AGAIN LOOK ROSY FOR THE WASAPIKA.

Many people do not look with special favour upon the Wasapika. This property, like some others, suffered at the hands of over-enthusiastic friends and brokers very optimistic in regard to the people in general risking their money in the Wasapika. More than one man has some Wasapika stock stowed away and counted in his mind as not among his liquid assets. To such the following item carried by Toronto and other outside papers last week will have more than passing interest:—

"The Wasapika gold mine of West Shiningtree had an authorized capital of \$1,000,000. Within the past year this stock could be bought at 10 cents per share or less. But after the consolidation the capitalization was increased to 6,000,000 shares of \$1 each. Lately \$1,600,000 of these shares have been sold for \$412,500. This is more than 25 cents a share and represents an advance of 1,500 per cent over the old quotations. Ten cents put a value of only \$100,000 on the whole property, and 25 cents on the 6,000,000 shares means a selling price of \$1,500,000.

"This is the most important deal consummated since the beginning of the war by the fact that the transaction is an actual sale and not a mere option on the stock. The purchasers are now arranging to send in heavy machinery before the snow goes.
