"SHOULD SPEND FEW MORE DOLLARS IN NORTH LAND"

"The Government should be reckless enough to spend a few more dollars in the North Country,"—this is the statement credited by despatches from Toronto as being made by Hon. Harry Mills, Minister of Mines in replying to a deputation asking for the extension of the T. & N. O. from Swastika to Westree. According to the despatch Mr. Mills said he was not personally in favour of this extension, but he was of the opinion "that the Government should be reckless enough to spend a few more dollars in the development of the north country." Further the Minister of Mines is credited with thinking that the Canadian National Railways should have done more to open up the mining districts of the north. Also he suggested that the Provincial Government was considering railway development in Northern Ontario and at the present time the Premier was in consultation with the T. & N. O. Railway Commission in the matter. Surveys should be made of the district to verify the claims of the deputation he thought. Hon. Beniah Bowman, who also was interviewed, thought that railways were badly needed in the North Country. Wagon roads, he considered, were not sufficient for such a country if it were to enjoy true progress and development. Mr. Bowman said he hoped that in the near future something material would be done to improve the transportation facilities in the North Land. There is more or less scuffling and Hon. Beniah Bowman and his readiness to agree with deputations, but it does seem that he has after all a better sense and foresight than his colleagues so far as the North is concerned. He has at least the virtue of an open mind and if he were allowed his own way the North Land would at least get something while the money lasted. The other members of the Farmers' Government seem to have no other idea of the North than a cow to be milked dry.

But to get back to Hon. Mr. Mills and the statement credited to him, "that the Government should be reckless enough to spend a few more dollars in the development of the North Country." If Mr. Mills said any such thing he evidenced the wrong attitude. The North Land does not want the Government to be reckless. It wants the Government to act in a common-sense farseeing business way about this country. There has been

too much recklessness already though it has been chiefly in devising ways and means for bleeding this land not feeding it. To see some recklessness in the way of expenditures for the North would be a novel and pleasing change. Yet the people do not want that. All they ask is a fair square deal. Let the Government first get an understanding and knowledge of the needs and possibilities of this country, and then let the money be wisely and carefully INVESTED in the development of this rich part of the Province. The returns will be gratifying beyond all present expectations. There is a wonderful heritage in this North Land with its wealth of forest and mine and its agricultural possibilities. All the country needs is a little wise encouragement and assistance to develop along the right lines. Money properly applied to the development of the North Land will not be "reckless spending,"—it will be the most profitable of economical investments. Knowledge, carefulness and foresight are what are needed, with the sympathetic understanding and co-operation that will be aroused when the Government KNOWS about this country and its possibilities and problems. Hon. Mr. Mills wants to avoid recklessness and thoughtlessness. They are but curses at all times. Good business judgment, knowledge and carefulness are the virtues to be embraced. Had Hon. Mr. Mills held to these virtues he would not have injured the North Land's development by leading his name to the Premier's proposed bill to squeeze a few extra hundred dollars out of the mining industry at the peril of ruining that industry. No Mr. Mills, the North Land does not counsel "reckless spending" even of a few dollars for its development. It would like a fair square inflexible deal, though. Yes! Thank you, very much.. Good evening!
