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**SCHUMACHER MINE MAY
 BE RE-OPENED THIS YEAR**

It is understood that arrangements are under consideration that may result in an early re-opening of the Schumacher Mine at Schumacher. Nothing official has been given out in regard to the re-opening. Indeed, the president, Mr. F. W. Schumacher has practically refused to commit himself one way or the other,—either to say the mine will be re-opened this summer, or that it will not. There seems to be an impression, however, in the minds of many who should be in a position to know, to take the view that the chances are very good for the re-opening of the Schumacher. Touching on this matter one day last week, The Toronto Mail & Empire published the following on its mining and financial page:—

"Mr. F. W. Schumacher, of Columbus, Ohio, was in the city yesterday attending to his various interests. Asked by The Mail & Empire whether the property at Porcupine which bears his name would resume operations this Spring, Mr. Schumacher said that this would depend entirely upon circumstances. He had come to Canada to look over the field, but was not in a position as yet to give a decided answer to the question set forth.

"There is," he added, "a steady process of deflation under way, and as this proceeds gold will come into its own once more. Personally I am optimistic regarding the future. I can see nothing but good fortune ahead of the Dominion after the present period of depression is passed. This applies with especial emphasis to Northern Ontario. The development of that region—great as have been the accomplishments of the past decade—has only been commenced."

"Mr. Schumacher says that he has every expectation that the Schumacher Mine will ultimately make good, but whether additional work will be done this season remains for the future to determine."
