Timmins News in Brief

BORN—In Timmins, on Sunday, May 1st, to Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Skelly,—a son.

The next regular meeting of the Town Council is scheduled for the Council Chamber next Monday afternoon, May 9th, at 4 p.m.

The public should remember the Wednesday half-holiday starting today in regard to the local stores. During May, June, July, August and September, the stores in Timmins will close at 1 p.m. each Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Geo. W. Lee, Chairman of the T. & N. O. Railway Commission, was a visitor to Timmins on Monday evening, making a trip in here on his way to the West. He was among the many passengers on the first trip north of the fine "Continental Limited," formerly the "National," and now running from Montreal to Vancouver.

Plans are understood to be under way to form a Tennis League to include the leading towns along the T. & N. O. from North Bay to Cochrane, and to include Timmins and Iroquois Falls. Rev. J. A. Donnell, of Haileybury, an enthusiastic tennis player, is taking a special interest in the League proposal.

The "Confetti Dance" at the McIntyre Recreation Hall, Schumacher, last Friday evening under the auspices of the McIntyre Entertaining Committee, proved a very enjoyable success. Many from Timmins attended the event and all speak of it as another of the pleasant dances for which the McIntyre Recreation Hall is becoming noted. Al Wilson's orchestra furnished the best of music, as usual, for the evening's pleasure.

It is expected that next month (June) 150 members of the Associated Boards of Ontario, with a particularly strong representation from the Toronto Board of Trade, will tour the North Land in a special train. They will go as far north and west as Kapuskasing. Timmins will be among the places at which call will be made. In August the Teachers of the Province will again tour the North Land. So, this year also promises to be "Delegation Year" or "Visitors' Year" for Timmins and the North.

It was expected that the re-opening would be about May 2nd, but the work of renovating and improving the building has taken more time than expected and the management will not open the theatre until ready to give the public the best accommodation and the finest equipment and fittings.

Mr. J. E. Wilson, former Chief of Police here, was in town over the week-end finishing the packing up and moving of the balance of his effects from town. Mr. Wilson is now residing with his family at Gowganda where he is in charge of the silver property formerly known as the Powerful Mine, but now under the ownership of the Miller Lake Gowganda Silver Mine Co. Mr. Wilson has very high hopes for the property and believes it will develop into an important producer.

Cochrane has been suffering from an influx of men out-of-work. Many of the newcomers have been destitute and the town of Cochrane has found it more than a burden to care for them. For some nights from 40 to 60 were sleeping on the station floor. Crimes of various kinds have been a more or less natural sequence to the gathering of the unemployed. The Northland Post calls on the Government to commence public works to give employment.

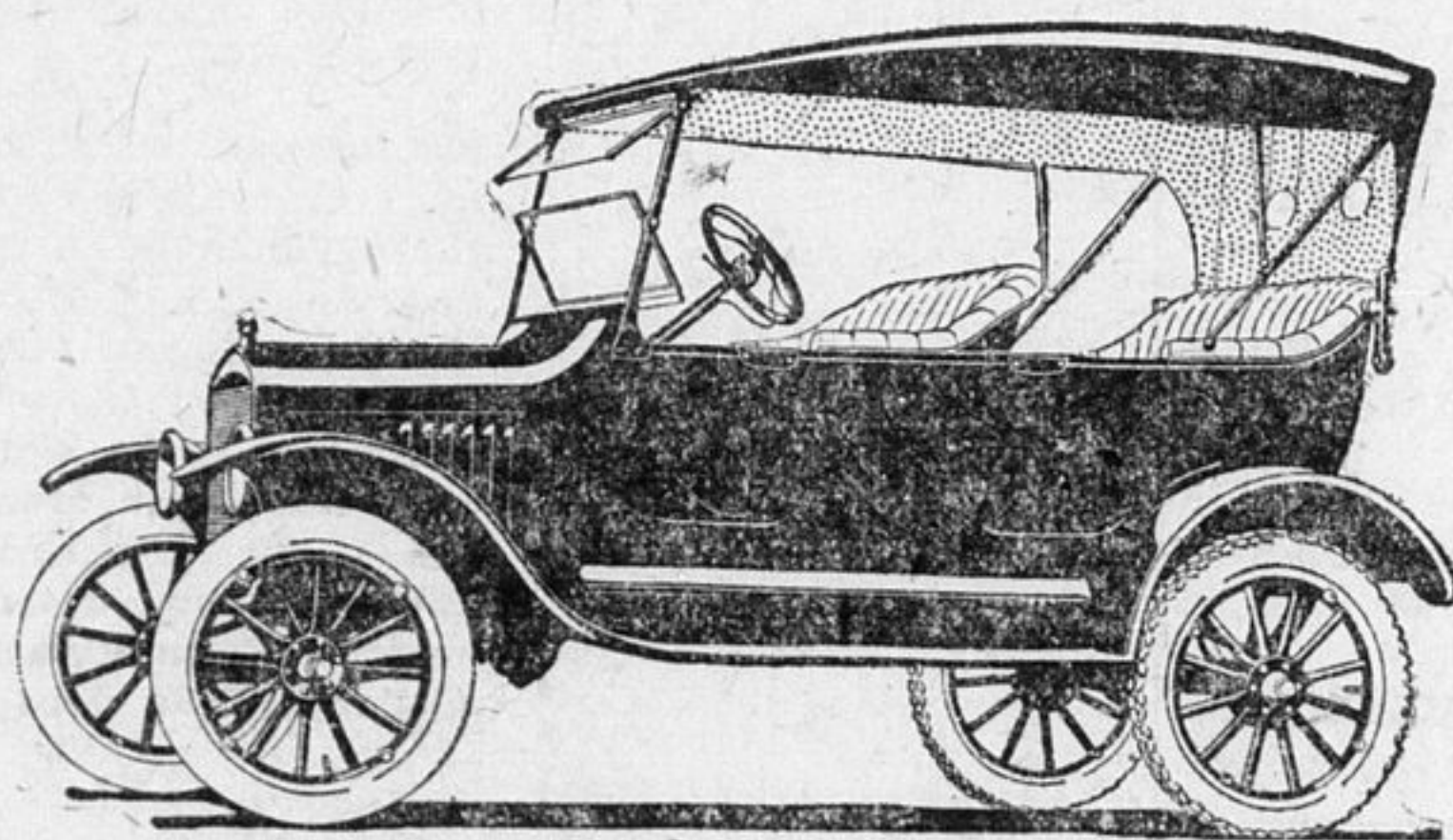
