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**FIVE YEAR TERM FOR MAN
 AT SCHUMACHER USING GUN**

Three Years in Kingston for Bold,
 Bad Hold-up Man. A Busy
 Police-Court.

Magistrate Atkinson had a busy and important day at police court here last Thursday. The six men and one woman arrested in connection with charges of wholesale theft and robbery were remanded until this week, but other important cases were proceeded with. A couple of severe sentences were handed out, but as usual with the judgments of Magistrate Atkinson they were in keeping with the seriousness of the offences charged and so not a bit more salutary than the cases demanded.

Tony Commizzio, a shoemaker of Schumacher, was sentenced to five years in Kingston penitentiary for some shooting he did on Sunday of last week on the public street. Commizzio, it appears, got into a card game at a friend's house and lost some money. He quarrelled as a consequence with John Markovitch. Then Commizzio went home and securing a gun came back to "lay for" Markovitch. When Markovitch came out of the house Commizzio started to shoot at him. Markovitch took to his heels and ran for his dear life. Commizzio kept on a shooting, but did not hit the fleeing man. One shot, however, went through the rim of Markovitch's hat. Evidence was given to show the extent and the danger of this public shooting exhibition. One witness, who knew neither of the men concerned personally and so had no interest or prejudice in the matter, gave particularly strong evidence for the prosecution. Magistrate Atkinson sentenced Commizzio to five years in Kingston penitentiary, considering no doubt not only the menace to Markovitch's life through the shooting by Commizzio, but also the general danger to the public through this sort of public shooting on street.

Another fellow to draw a stiff sentence was Alex Demovitch, a Bulgarian, about 27 years old. Demovitch was charged with holding up a Spaniard on the railroad tracks here on Tuesday evening of last week. The latter gentleman was walking on the tracks with a Bulgarian named Marinz Pena, when Demovitch appeared with a handkerchief round the lower

part of his face to conceal his mug and ordered "hands up." Both men put their hands above their head, and Demovitch went through the Spaniard's pockets taking his money, some \$63.00. The Spaniard informed the police as soon as he was able to get away. Constables Grenier and McCauley were soon on the trail of Demovitch and eventually placed him under arrest just as he was about to secure a room at a local hotel for the night. Constable Grenier conducted Demovitch to a selected room in the Hotel de Greer. The money taken from the Spaniard was found on Demovitch. Demovitch eventually came through with the story that the hold-up had been planned between him and Marinz Pena. Pena, according to this yarn, was to get the Spaniard down the track and then he was to be held up. Pena denied this, but the police, not wishing to miss any chances, laid a charge against Pena as well as Demovitch in connection with the hold-up. On Thursday, however, the case against Pena was dismissed, but Demovitch was found guilty of robbery with violence and was sentenced to three years in Kingston penitentiary.

There were two \$200.00 fines in connection with breaches of the O.T.A. Alex Smith, for having liquor in other than his private dwelling house was fined \$200.00 and costs, and a similar fine and costs were imposed upon Sam Davlis for a similar offence. Chief Greer says that he may not always find what he is looking for, but he is always sure to find something or other. Last week he was out searching for the clothing stolen from S. Bucovetsky's store. He did not find the clothes he was searching for on that particular occasion, but he did find the liquor that brought the \$200 fine for Sam Davlis.

There were, of course, two or three charges of being drunk, drawing the usual \$10.00 and costs at the Thursday session of the police court.

Lucien Vendon, on a charge of being disorderly, was fined \$10.00 and costs. He had raised a disturbance in the Lunch Car recently.

A. Gazde, second-hand store man, was fined \$50.00 and costs for breach of the law in failing to keep proper records of all purchases and sales.

J. McDonald was charged under complaint of B. Lennan with unlawfully appropriating to his own use some timbers the property of Mr. Lennan. The accused was moving a house and seeing the timbers and being unable to locate their owner used

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them as convenient for sills during the moving. As soon as he was through with the timbers Mr. McDonald returned them to where he had found them. In the meantime, however, Mr. Lennan had missed his timbers and laid a charge. The case was adjusted by Mr. McDonald paying \$5.00 damages and costs.

Pete Paterick, of Moneta, was charged with teaming in town without the necessary license, contrary to the town by-law in the matter. The case was remanded for a week.

**MANY SUDBURY MEN HERE,
 TIMMINS MAN IN SUDBURY?**

There is a saying to the effect that a fair exchange is no breach of the Ontario Temperance Act. So, Timmins having recently secured a large number of good men from Sudbury it is only fair that an occasional Timmins man should go to Sudbury. He did. Or at least The Sudbury Star says so. One of the great needs of Sudbury at the present time is lots of work and this man has provided

heaps of work for a whole lot of people, chiefly police. The Sudbury Star tells the story in this paragraph from its latest issue:—"Arthur Boulay, one of the central figures in a certain thrilling chase at Espanola last week which resulted in a fine of \$10 and costs on a charge of assault on Saturday, pleaded guilty through his counsel to selling liquor at a house on the Coniston road. Inspector Kilpatrick said a couple of "spotters" visited the place and that Boulay promptly fled to Espanola on discovering what had happened. He originally came from Timmins. Counsel for the defence said that the prisoner was married on April 26th and was on his honeymoon when he got into the mix-up at the paper town. Boulay was fined \$500 and costs or three months.

On Saturday Chief Greer arrested B. Loneyez on a charge of obtaining goods under false pretences, the complainant being Mr. S. Bucovetsky from whose store the goods were said to have been obtained by improper representations.

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
