**"GIRL IN RED" BY LOCAL
TALENT, GREAT SUCCESS**

Musical Comedy Exceptionally Well
Given to Big Audiences.

The presentation of the musical comedy, "The Girl in Red" by local talent, under the auspices of the Timmins Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire, last Wednesday and Thursday proved unusually successful and pleasing. There was an interesting plot to the comedy, and lots of very attractive music. The scenic effects were particularly noteworthy. The whole event reflects the highest credit on all concerned. Those taking part are mentioned below, and it is almost sufficient to say that each took his or her part perfectly. Special mention may, however, be made of the fine portrayal given by Mr. Geo. Drew of the gay old bird, James Goodwin. Mrs. McInnis, as the mother-in-law, took a difficult role very effectively. Mr. Wm. Mackie, Mr. Snow, Miss Muriel Fyfe, Miss Irene Carswell, Mrs. H. Webb, and Miss Agnes Angrignon also deserve special mention for the capable and effective way in which they carried through their parts.

In the musical part of the programme, Mrs. M. B. Scott and chorus set a very high standard in the opening number, "The Glory of the Grand Old Flag." Mrs. Scott's fine voice was heard to advantage and the beauty and harmonious singing of the chorus were very pleasing. The solo parts by Master Frances Woodbury, Master Norman Webb and little Miss Margaret Easton completely delighted the audiences.

Mrs. J. K. Moore and Mr. O'Brien in the duet, "The Cynical Owl," made a decided hit with the audience at each appearance, the chorus for this number also being very effective.

"Ching Chong" was one of the prettiest numbers of the event, the duet part being very effectively taken by Mrs. W. D. Forrester and Mr. Geo. Moore, and the chorus being attractive and pleasing.

"Mammy" was a very popular item on the programme, the singing of Mrs. J. K. Moore, Mr. Snow and Mr. Street bringing much well-merited applause.

Another special was "Poppyland" in which Mrs. Moore took the solo part, and was assisted by a well-trained chorus.

The costumes for the various numbers were especially good, and the staging left nothing to be desired. As a musical comedy, the event in every way outclassed the average musical comedy by professionals. The director, Mr. Bird, the Daughters of the Empire, and all in any way concerned with the success of the "Girl in Red" deserve the greatest credit for the presentations here.

Thursday evening's presentation had a number of special extra features, including two well-given recitations by Mr. Theodore Bird, the director. The singing of Master Frank

Carnow, and the surprise occasioned by his doffing of his wig, were special pleasures for the audience. Another very special extra was Miss Jessie Marshall with the walking doll, a specialty that delighted the crowd.

Mrs. J. W. Faithful contributed much to the success of the event by her good work as accompanist, while the orchestra music was another special feature.
