**THE SEVEN NATIONS TO  
OBSERVE MAGNA CHARTA DAY**

The proposal has been made to have **THE SEVEN NATIONS** this year hold a general observance of Magna Charta Day, Wednesday, June 15th. The matter has been very ably expounded by Mr. J. W. Hamilton, of St. Paul, Minn., who has interested the management of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, which in turn has made use of its branches to give the question publicity. In a brochure written by Mr. Hamilton the "stately stepping stones on freedom's highway,"—the parliament, trial by jury, the Magna Charta, habeas corpus, right of petition, etc., are referred to as founding democracy for the world. The extent to which the United States framed its laws and constitution upon British precedents is also acknowledged, and Mr. James Wallace of Macalester College, St. Paul, Minn., is quoted very appropriately as saying: "Only the English-speaking nations can claim so rich a political heritage. To it add the heritages of a common language and a copious literature, to these, again, the molding of a Christianity aglow with altruism and essential democracy and we have a foundation for peace, amity and co-operation among English-speaking nations whereon it were recreant to the great interests of mankind not to build."

In his brochure Mr. J. W. Hamilton consistently spells "The Seven Nations" in capital letters. He says: "The words are thus emphasized so as to impress your mind with the essential and actual solidarity of **THE SEVEN NATIONS**—The United States, Great Britain and Ireland, Newfoundland, Canada, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand;—a solidarity not due to their area, popula-

tions, wealth or even to their common language, nor to the fact that they border the earth's four corners. Their unity is rather one of spirit, for these nations are the founders and representatives of democracy, the political expression of Christianity, with all which that word implies in freedom, civil and religious. They represent a world encircling state of mind, a more perfect ideal than has ever been on so great a scale. It is a unity in the opportunity which they offer to men everywhere of like mind; men who believe in this freedom and who gladly accept the responsibility which is at once its outcome and its protection. It is a unity in their example to other nations of social and political development; a very definite expression of the hope of international good-will and world betterment; something infinitely greater than their wealth, their power and their industry."

To foster and enlarge these ideas and ideals, it is suggested that Magna Charta Day be generally observed by **THE SEVEN NATIONS**. A programme of patriotic songs, addresses, etc., is outlined, and union or mass meetings suggested, for Magna Charta Day, June 15th.

**CALEDONIAN SOCIETY  
EVENING SAIL ON MINGA**

As mentioned in the last issue of The Advance, the Caledonian Society of Timmins are holding an evening excursion on the MINGA tomorrow (Thursday) evening, June 9th. Tickets are now on sale at Mr. J. K. Moore's store, and any member of the Society desiring to enjoy the pleasure of the trip on the MINGA on Thursday of this week should secure the tickets at Mr. Moore's. The Society has over 100 members, but it is not thought likely that all the members will be able to take in the excursion. The MINGA has a carrying capacity of between 40 and 50, and if more than this number of tickets are sold the following evening (Friday) will be used to accommodate the ticket buyers who can not go on Thursday evening. If there are only enough tickets sold for the accommodation that can be provided on Thursday evening the boat will be chartered for that evening only. In case seventy or eighty tickets are sold, however, the boat will be chartered for the two evenings, Thursday and Friday, arrangements having been made to this effect in case of necessity.

The trip on the MINGA on Thursday is for members of the Caledonian Society only. Only the bare costs of the trip is being charged to the members, the tickets being sold at \$1.00 each, the rate charged for the boat.

The Steamer MINGA will leave the Timmins landing Thursday evening at 7 p.m. In case more tickets are sold than the number of passengers that can be accommodated to-morrow night, the balance of the members will be taken on a second chartered trip on Friday evening, June 10th.
