#### THIS MAN ACCUSED OF BEING TOO GOOD A WRITER

A man named Richard Toland is in he jail here because he is charged with writing not wisely but too well. According to the police he wrote so well that the bank gave him \$125.00 on the strength of his writing of another man's name. The other man kasing. Mr. Finlayson had been beson worked at the Hollinger and had an account in the Imperial Bank here as well as a large balance at Kapuskasing. Mr. Finleyson had been befriending Toland who seemed to be in poor luck, but last week Toland announced that he was going away "You have been so good to me," he is reported as saying to Mr. Finlayson, "that I will want to write to you, so give me your address." Mr. Finlayson wrote down his name and address as desired. "Do you always write like that?" Toland is said to have asked. Mr. Finlayson said he did. The next day Toland left. That closed chapter one in the story.

The second chapter opened with Mr. Finlayson finding his two bank books gone. At the bank he learned to his surprise that a cheque for \$125 had been paid out in his supposed signature. Then he went to Chief Greer, and the chapters at once began to tumble after one another with lots of action and excitement.

Chief Greer heard Mr. Finlayson's story and piecing the information together he thought Toland should be located at once. Toland was traced to South Porcupine where he went by rig and there the one bank book was recovered where it had apparently been thrown away. Toland was apparently headed for Toronto, and an address was secured in the city where Toland was likely to visit his wife. His wife had moved, and by the time Toland reached the new address the city detectives were there ready for him and took him in charge. Constable Roy went to Toronto and brought the prisoner back on Saturday evening last. Toland is in jail here awaiting trial before Magistrate Atkinson to-morrow (Thursday) on charges in connection with the irregularities regarding the cheque and the bank books. He is very sorry

now about the affair. According to the police case, Toland is alleged to have taken the two bank books to the bank. He asked to have the money in the bank at Kapuskasing transferred here, suggesting that it would take some days to reach here. On the money in the bank here he is charged with drawing the cheques for \$125.00 in Finlayson's name. The whole proceeding, his possession of the bank books, the fact that he did not attempt to actually draw any money from the larger account, the signature and the endorsement he was ready to make, all kept the bank officials from being unduly

suspicious. Toland's side of the story will be a matter for interest.
