MANY MINOR CASES AT POLICE COURT THURSDAY

There were nine little cases at the police court on Thursday last, only one of them being of any particular importance. This was the case of Richard Toland, a young fellow of 22 years, who had drawn \$125.00 of another man's money from the bank. His young wife came up from Toronto to plead for him and had also succeeded in securing the money from her brother to make full restitution. Mrs. Toland had secured Mr. D. W. O'Sullivan to represent the accused, and Mr. O'Sullivan made a very effective plea for leniency, emphasizing the youth of the prisoner, his previous good character, his present penitence, the fact that restitution had been fully made, and that any punishment would bear the heaviest upon the innocent and loyal little wife. Magistrate Atkinson gave the young prisoner a stern lecture, emphasizing the seriousness of what he had done, and urging him to make himself worthy of the wife who had shown such loyalty and honesty, her first care apparently having been to right the wrong done by her husband, her efforts first being centered on having full restitution made. The Magistrate warned the young man that any further wrong-doing on his part would be severely punished, but in view of his youth, and taking the other facts into consideration, he was going to give him a chance this time. The offence was too serious to go altogether unpunished, but he would impose the light sentence of 60 days in jail. At the end of the two months he hoped Toland would play the man and by the uprightness of his life in coming years make up for his present lapse from the right. Toland has been married only about six months and it is said that his anxiety to get to Toronto to join his wife who was working there was the main cause prompting him to securing the money.

There were the usual number of drunks before the court. The fee was the usual "ten dollars and costs" in each case, except that of Jake Prelimsky. Jake was positive he was never drunk in his life. It cost Jake \$20.00 and costs.
