TIMMINS JUNIORS WIN FOOTBALL MATCH, 5 TO 1.

There were 125 paid admissions last Friday off the Junior Football match, Timmins vs. Dome, in the N.O.F.A. Junior series. The game proved a clean, clever fast exhibit of football, and aroused much interest. The Dome boys put up a good brand of football, but were outclassed by the Timmins boys as the score suggests, Timmins winning 5 to 1. It was a good game in every way and showed a much more classy brand of football than any played last year by the Juniors. Mr. Alex Cadman refereed the game to the general satisfaction of all, though he admits it was harder than refereeing a Senior game, the boys keeping him on the double jump all the time. For Timmins, Joe Landers the right half was undoubtedly the star. Stevenson, in goal, was very good, making a number of clever saves. Smith and Lawlor at back made a fine defence that took some work to beat, while the half-backs, Landers, H. Auer and Albert Kendall were right on the job all the time. The forward line,—Cockburn, Andy Roberts, Dugmore, K. Auer, and Twaddle, were also clever at the game and steady workers. In short, Timmins Juniors showed a well-balanced team, with good combination play, doing the highest credit to the boys and to Mr. W. A. Field who has had charge of their training and coaching.

The Timmins Football Club has been under heavy expenses generally without much returns so far, and as the Timmins Football Club is looking after the financing of the Juniors, Mr. W. A. Field suggests that if the general public are as interested as they appear to be they could give a help along by loaning their autos to take the boys out to the games at the Dome in the League series. Three or four autos would easily look after the team for these games. It would mean a noteworthy saving for the boys. Anyone who can thus assist in this "transportation problem" should see that "Football Field" man about it.

Church, and interment being made in the R. C. cemetery, Timmins.
