Hon. Harry Mills, Minister of Mines, together with Dr. Miller, Provincial Geologist, and T. G. Sutherland, Chief Mining Inspector, paid a visit to Timmins over the week-end. They did. They were very quiet about it. The Mayor hunted them up and as usual explained the conditions and needs of this district. Saturday the party went underground at the big mine. The Board of Trade and other public bodies here had intended to have a talk to the Honourable Minister of Mines, but apparently he was not seeking the limelight. Few in town knew the party were here. On Sunday the Honourable Minister took a pleasant cruise up the river. It is to be hoped he had a pleasant time and a nice rest during his visit here. On Monday the Minister and his party went on to South Porcupine where a meeting of the Prospectors' Association was arranged. Hon. Mr. Mills addressed this meeting, giving his views on the problems arising. Judging from the reports of Hon. Mr. Mills' remarks and general attitude, it would appear that he would gladly give the prospectors and the mining industry a square and intelligent deal. It would be interesting to learn who the villain may be who throws the monkey-wrench into the machinery. In regard to the geological survey

in this district, practically promised some months ago, it is understood that the work of this geological survey will be taken up as soon as a suitable man can be released to look after the work.
