LIKELY CLIFTON MILL RE-OPEN EARLY THIS FALL

Milling Plant to be Installed. Further
Development Planned. Holiday
Season Has Delayed Finan-
cing.

Throughout the Porcupine Camp
generally there has been much inter-
est in the Clifton-Porcupine, a prop-
erty that a great many old-timers
have the fullest confidence in its pros-
pects of developing into a producing
mine of importance. There was much
regret when the general conditions
caused a stoppage of work on the prop-
erty, and an announcement of the
resuming of operations has been
eagerly looked forward to. The ex-
act position of the Clifton is made
clear by the following letter sent to
shareholders last week by order of the
directors:

"Since operating conditions for
Gold mines began to improve a few
months ago, your Directors have tried
very hard to arrange for the sale of
an additional block of our Treasury
stock. The object was to proceed with
the development of your property,
and in particular, the building of a
milling plant which would be used to
treat the tonnage of commercial ore
which has been placed in sight.

"So far, we regret to advise that
these negotiations have not been suc-
cessful. The real reason for lack of
success has been the close approach
of the holiday season and the gener-
ally quiet markets which usually accom-
pany it. We believe that there is
every likelihood however that these
negotiations can be brought to a
successful conclusion in the early
Fall. In this event, the attention of
the management will be centred on
completing the mill and on bringing
the property to the producing stage
before the end of the current year.

"Your Directors have been keenly
disappointed with the fact that it was
ever necessary to suspend develop-
ment of the property, especially in
view of the very encouraging results
which attended the work done. This
necessity arose however by reason of
conditions which could not be fore-
seen and over which we had no con-
trol. Happily, these conditions have
changed, and the outlook for the Gold
mining industry is now brighter than
it has been for many years.

INTERESTING BOOK RE COMMERCE STAFF IN WAR

The Canadian Bank of Commerce
has recently published for private dis-
tribution a very interesting volume
that suggests the goodly part taken
in the Great War by the Bank's staff.
Over 1700 of the men employed by the
Canadian Bank of Commerce enlisted
for overseas service and 258 of them
gave their lives in the struggle for
right and decency in the world of na-
tions. The Bank of Commerce men
overseas were represented in every
line of service at the front. Several of
them won V. C.'s, and practically
every other known decoration for val-
our and service was won by one or
another of the Bank of Commerce
men overseas.

In 1915 the Bank decided to publish
selected letters written back by mem-
bers of the staff overseas, so as to
keep the men on duty at the front
and the men on duty at home in close
touch with one another. These letters
were edited by Mr. Chas. Lyons Fos-
ter, staff inspector, who gave the finest
efficiency and loyalty to the work.
At the close of the war there were
eleven of these brochures containing
"Letters from the Front." These
letters gave an intimate and striking
human story of operations, and life,
and death, in many sectors of the bat-
tlefields of the great conflict. Many
of the letters evidence distinctive lit-
erary ability; all of them have the hu-
man touch that makes them of pecu-
liar historical value as coming from
men who played a noteworthy part
and gathered their impressions from
the scene of action and in the turmoil
of the great struggle itself.

These "Letter from the Front" are
now being published in more perman-
ent form under the careful and cap-
able editorship of Mr. William S.
Duthie. There will be several volumes
of them, Volume I, being recently is-
sued. Volume I is a handsome book,
well-bound and elegantly printed. It
makes a striking and valuable addi-
tion to war literature. There is an
effective preface to the volume by Sir
John Aird, the General Manager. A
record is given of all enlisting, with
the dates of enlistment and the
branches where the men were station-
ed at the time of enlistment. Port-
raits of those who laid down their
lives for their country and humanity,
affixed in a reasonable length of time.
