NORTH BAY POLICE FULLY VINDICATED BY JUDGE

Judge Valin has given his report
in the case of the police investigation
at North Bay. The report fully vin-
dicates Chief Raymor and his staff,
and recommends that they be paid for
the time they were off duty owing to
the Mayor's suspension. The Chief
and his men were charged with not
properly enforcing the town by-laws,
with laxity in enforcing the O.T.A.,
and with general inefficiency. On ac-
count of complaints Mayor Ferguson
suspended them. Then an investiga-
tion was ordered before the Judge. No
specific charges were made regard-
ing the Chief or any of his staff, and
after several adjournments of the en-
quiry, the publishing of a request in
the North Bay papers for any or all
who had complaints or grievances to
make them known, the Judge on June
29th, publicly addressed all in the
court room and asked if any had any
charges to prefer against the police.
"No one offered any charges or
evidence," the report says. The re-
port concludes with the words, "I
therefore beg to report to your Coun-
cil that the charges preferred by the
Mayor against the Police Department
have not been substantiated and no
other charges have been presented. I
therefore recommend that the salary
of Chief Raymor and Constables in
question be paid for the period of
suspension."

On account of the intense heat, the
baseball match on the Mines League
schedule—Hollinger at Timmins,—
for the week-end just passed, was
postponed by mutual consent of the
teams concerned.

to, was drowned at Twin Falls. The
lad was playing with another boy in
the cement sheds and wharf of Mor-
row & Beatty, contractors. It is
thought that in running from the
shed he slipped and fell off the dock.
Search was made last week to recover
the body. On account of the muddy
water a diver who went down was un-
able to see anything, so then grapple
irons were used and the water
dragged. The bereaved father, Mr.
Anderson, is employed as a machinist
at Twin Falls. Great sympathy is felt
by all for Mr. Anderson and his wife
in the tragedy.

McINTYRE-PORCUPINE HAS HAD PROSPEROUS YEAR

The annual statement of the McIn-
tyre-Porcupine Mines is now being
prepared and it is understood that it
will show the past year as a very
prosperous and pleasing one for the
McIntyre. It is said that the report
indicates slightly higher average
grade of ore, with a heavy increase in
the ore reserves which are always
conservatively estimated by the McIn-
tyre. The McIntyre directors will
meet this month to declare a five per-
cent dividend, but further increased
dividends may be considered at the
annual meeting which will be held in
September. The McIntyre is making
very satisfactory progress all along
the line and is now one of the out-
standing mining properties of the
North Land.

TOWNS DONATE TO COST OF THE UNIQUE N.O.H.A. TROPHY

North Bay, Sault Ste. Marie and
Timmins have each contributed \$100
to defray the cost of the N.O.H.A.
cup. This cup, as noted in previous
issues was made from products of the
North Land,—gold, silver, nickel, cop-
per, iron, etc.—and is emblematic of
the hockey championship of the
North Land. It was understood that
each of the towns in the North Land
should contribute \$100,00, but up to
the present only the three places men-
tioned have come across to that extent.
New Liskeard (formerly known as
the "Hockey Town") gave only \$50,
so hereafter New Liskeard will be
better recognized as a Farmers' Town.
Cobalt also has contributed \$50 to-
wards the cost of the cup, though Co-
balt had no team in the League this
year and also has recently been in a
rather difficult position financially. Iro-
quois Falls at a recent Council meet-
ing deferred the question of a contri-
bution to a later date. Haileybury
and Sudbury have not yet made any
contribution. Summing up, there is
now \$350.00 in the hands of Secretary
Charlton of the N.O.H.A. as dona-
tions towards the cost of this cup.
The three towns named,—Timmins,
North Bay and the Sault,—each
contributing \$100.00 and the other
\$50.00 coming from Liskeard. Co-
balt's Council passed its \$50.00 grant
some weeks ago, but the actual cheque
has not yet arrived. The cup, which
is certainly a beautiful and unusual
one, cost in the neighborhood of \$600,
so the other towns like Sudbury, Hai-

lebury and Iroquois Falls certainly
should come across at an early date,
so that they may not be looked upon
as breaking the promises or under-
standing in regard to the defraying of
the cost of the cup.

MILLER INDEPENDENCE READY FOR DEVELOPMENT

The recent \$50,000.00 bond issue of
the Miller-Independence Mine at Bos-
ton Creek is understood to be now
fully subscribed and as a consequent
development work at the property
will be renewed on a large scale. It
is understood that a very extensive
diamond drilling campaign is to be
undertaken at the Miller-Independence
to prove the property. The bond
issue being sold clears the way for
the development and provides the re-
quired money to prove the mine by
development. The whole \$50,000.00
bond issue is understood to have been
taken up by the existing shareholders
of the Miller-Independence, this being
another evidence of their belief
in the property. Practically all the
heavy shareholders of the Miller-Independence
live at Dayton, Ohio,
where the head office of the company
is located. The directors and many of
the shareholders make frequent visits
to Boston Creek and keep in close
touch with the property.

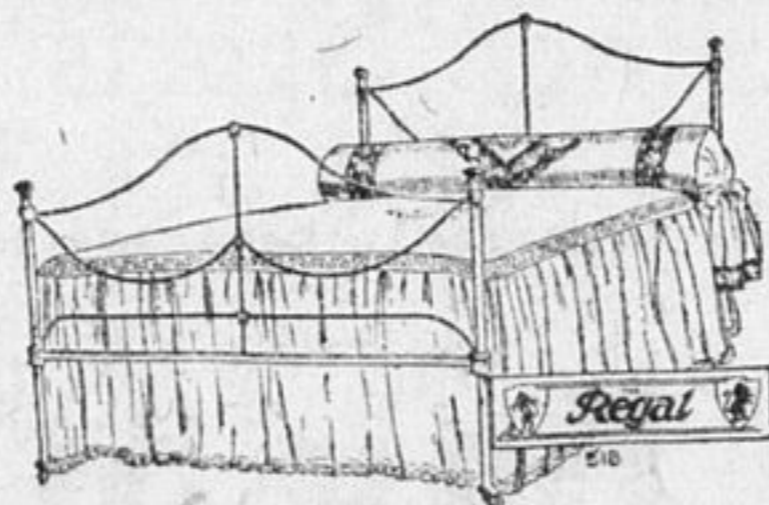

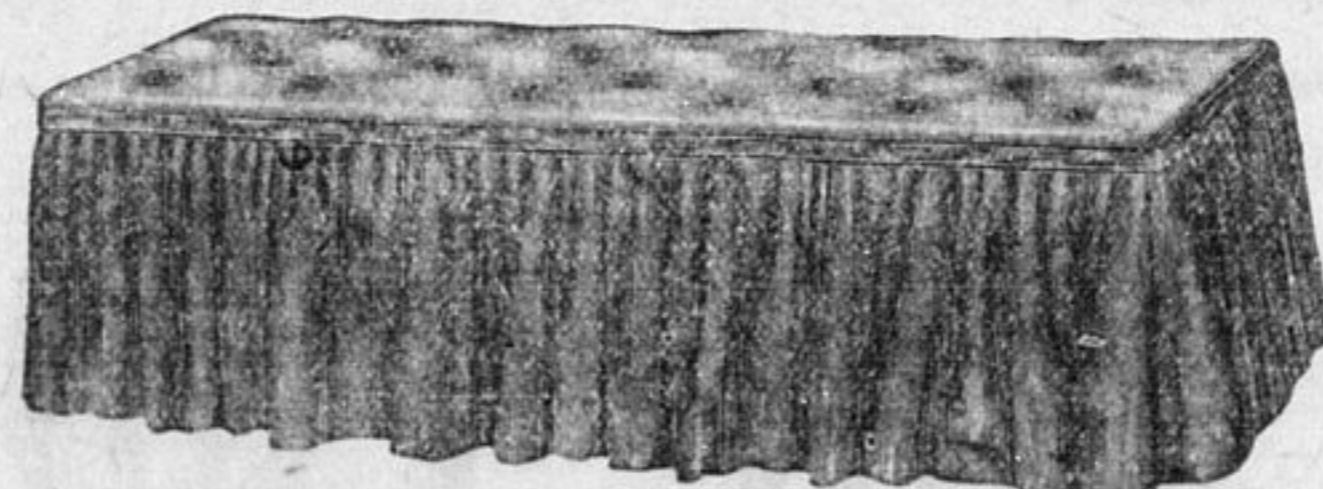
