PRESIDENTS OF GOLDALE MINES VISITS THE CAMP

Mr. J. Y. Murdoch, barrister and solicitor, of Toronto, and president of the Goldale Mines Co., was a visitor to Timmins last week. The Goldale Mines own a number of promising properties in the Porcupine. Recently work has been centered on the former Bering-Moreng property at Pearl Lake, the Goldale having taken over the big interests of the English syndicate in the North Land. Results of the work so far have been eminently satisfactory, the showings being particularly good. Diamond drilling is finished for the present and it will now be decided as to whether a new shaft will be put down or the one on the property now dewatered. The latter is down 200 feet, but during the time the mine was not under development has lled with water. Mr. H. E. Crawford, of Los Angeles, California, a mining engineer of high reputation, is consulting engineer for the Goldale Mines, and is expected here at an early date.

The Goldale also owns the townsite at the Mattagami River, adjoining Mr. Auer's townsite by the river, and also adjoining on the west the townsite where the new Hollinger houses are being erected. Lots in this new townsite are now on sale, advertisement to this effect being recently carried in these columns. In adjusting the new townsite it will be necessary to move a number of squatters on the property, but this will be done in the easiest possible way, with the least possible inconvenience or cost to the squatters, the plan likely being to give the squatters other land elsewhere at nominal rates so that the new townsite may be built up in approved manner.

FIRST ANNUAL REGATTA PLEASES BIG CROWDS

List of Winners of Events At Mattagami River on Wednesday Last.

The first annual Regatta, under the auspices of the Timmins Citizens' Band, held at the Mattagami River on Wednesday afternoon last, proved a successful and pleasing event, and the public generally will be agreeable to having it an annual event. The Committee in charge, and especially the chairman, Mr. C. E. MacDonald who gave so much time and attention to the preparations, are to be commended and congratulated on the enjoyment generally given by the Regatta. Despite the weather,—weather so threatening, indeed, that in the morning there was question about postponing the event,—there was a big crowd at the Timmins Landing for the official opening of the Regatta, and during the afternoon more kept coming down. The public certainly gave generous support to the Band on this occasion, and there was general appreciation of the programme, though the crowds would have enjoyed more band music during the afternoon. In the evening the Band played a number of selections, and the residents of the cottages along the river showed their appreciation of this and of the day's event by making up a purse of around \$20.00 which was duly presented to the Timmins Citizens Band.

The programme for the day was an attractive one and was pleasing to the crowd from beginning to end, practically no item failing to win interest and approval. There was special interest shown in the Prospectors' Race, the Tilting contest, the log-rolling and the Water Polo game between South Porcupine and Timmins teams. The Prospectors' Race, indeed, raised such special interest that there is now talk of another and longer one to be held at an early date. Water-Polo also appealed to the crowd as a likely sport for summer and several other matches are planned to be held here and at South End in the next month or two. In the tilting and log-rolling, Mr. Dave Carling showed that he has his old-time skill and that he has no equal hereabouts in these lines. In the swimming and diving there was keen competition and good work shown.

The 1921 Regatta was generally approved and appreciated and this feature is likely to be one of the most popular summer events for the Porcupine in the years to come.

The Fire Ranger and His Job



DOTTED over 100,000,000 acres of forest, 1,000 men, organized in the employ of the Government of Ontario, are, this summer, passing back and forth over the canoe routes and along the railways, watching out for the tell-tale smoke which is the sign of fire. Regardless of hot weather, black flies, mosquitoes, discomfort, loneliness or monotony, the Fire Ranger makes his rounds, preventing, quenching or fighting fires in Ontario's forests, paying his own living and traveling expenses, and receiving \$3.00 per day for his services.

All in all, the Ontario Fire Ranger is entitled to the help and co-operation of everyone. He deserves all the support the people of Ontario can give him. His work is of vital importance. Heed his warnings. Do what he asks.

Save Ontario's Forests They're Yours

The Ontario Fire Ranger, during the danger period of the dry summer, is constantly on patrol to catch fires while they are small. He cannot prevent them starting, as a rule. He is at the mercy of all types of carelessness. Thanks to his vigilance, however, two-thirds of the forest fires in the last four years did not spread beyond five acres and of these, half did not exceed one-quarter acre.

Most of Ontario's Fire Rangers are northern woodsmen. Contrary to common belief, only five per cent. of them are students, and these are experienced Fire Rangers or returned soldiers.

Rangers travel chiefly by canoe and in pairs over a definite "beat", the length of which varies according to the degree of danger from fires.

Others travel up and down the forested railway sections on hand velocipedes, following trains to put out fires set by steam locomotives. In all, 2,160 miles of railroad are patrolled steadily all summer.

Two men devote their whole time to examining locomotives to see that screens and ashpans will not permit the escape of sparks and live coals. In the clay belt, a large force of Rangers supervise settlers' fires in land-clearing operations.

Don't blame the Fire Ranger if he asks you to be careful. Don't think he is too particular. He knows the risk. Ontario is poorer by untold millions of dollars through forest fires in the past. Help the Fire Ranger save the increasingly valuable forests that remain.
