fering from the high cost of coal and the lack of cheap power and transportation facilities. The extension of the railway from Cochrane will make available waterpowers capable of developing more than one hundred thousand horsepower of electric energy. This should lead to the electrification of the T. & N. O., and prove a great boon to the mining, lumbering and pulp and paper industries.

"Some weks ago Premier Drury was dublous about the advisability of proceeding with the extension at this time. But a visit to North Bay, the degree of unemployment in Northern Ontario, and the persistence of Mac Lang, the member for Cochrane, along with the evidence of a sure return for the investment of \$3,500,000 in building the additional 70 miles of lines, caused him to urge his cabinet to sanction the understaking.

"The older part of Ontario has not done anything in a big way for our provincial hinterland for a long time. In directing work to proceed on a stretch of railway that will bridge more than one-third of the gap between Cochrane and James Bay, the province is recognizing one of the outstanding needs of the north country and doing something worth while for itself."

That is all very well, Mr. Toronto Star. In the words of a famous oldtime comic opera, "It is all very well to dissemble your love, but why did you kick us downstairs?" In other words, why has the greatest need of the North Land, -good roads, -been sidetracked? The proposed North Land highway would do much more to assist the present development and progress of the North Land than two railway extensions to Tin Can wilderness. In addition the cutting of the right-of-way for the proposed highway would give employment in practical and economical way to a much larger number of people than wild be possible in the case of the railway extension, and the relief of unemployment in the south is one of the prime reasons given for the early start on the railway extension to Tin Can.

The attitude of most of the people in the North Land at present is, "Well, let us be thankful the Government is willing to do anything. There are, of course, more pressing needs Chan that extension, but if we cannot they should be, well, let us take any-

As a matter of fact, if the Government is committeed to the "On-to-Tin Can' extension, the highway project should also be taken up not only to supply a real need of the North Land but also as a practical and economical method of relieving the menace of serious unemployment in the south.

HOLTYREX GOLD MINES TO DO DIAMOND DRILLING

It is understood that the Holtyrex Gold Mines, Limited, is planning to do considerable diamond drifling at an early date. The Holtyrex's name is made up of the "Hol" of Hollinger, the "tyre" of McIntyre, and the "x" to stand for extension. The property joins the McIntyre on the north east, and according to a recent letter from the Holtyrex Co. about 3500 feet of the Hollinger-McIntyre ore zone will run across the Holtyrex. Development work, according to the same letter, has been done on the Holtyrex on the surface and by a shaft sunk to 55 feet. "It shows up this remarkable Hollinger-McIntyre zone that runs across Holtyrex as we'll as the ore


