**ANOTHER FINE MARKET
GARDEN NEAR TIMMINS**

Anyone searching for evidence of the special qualifications of this district for growing market garden produce would find many superior gardens to prove his point. Even a person seeking to avoid proofs of this country's superiority in the line of producing vegetables, etc., would have some difficulty these days in escaping the strongest sort of evidence. The Advance has made many references recently to fine gardens in this immediate district and the excellent produce grown around here this year. Even with the many references made, some of the best gardens have not been mentioned. To mention them all this year would mean the publishing of a regular catalogue. Special notices, however, should be made of the garden of Mr. Dave Carling in the Matta gami district. The amount of produce he has grown on the lots purchased this spring from Mr. C. M. Auer is certainly noteworthy, but the quality is even more deserving of words of praise. Mr. Carling's garden is also worth a special word on account of the variety of vegetables produced. Potatoes, beans, peas, and practically everything else in the vegetable line grew and grew well in that really remarkable garden of Mr. Carling's. Also, it may be noted that he ripened tomatoes successfully. While many of the products of his garden were outstanding on account of their unusual size, none of them sacrificed quality to size; they were all first-class in every way. Some weeks ago some of Mr. Carling's garden products were on exhibition in the Hollinger Stores window and attracted considerable attention. There was a 20 pound cabbage, big and round and sound and savoury; celery as white as snow and as tender as they make 'em; cauliflower, with milk white cen-

tre, firm and close and as pretty headed as one would see in five days' journey. Local gardeners have been supplying the finest celery, lettuce, cabbage, cauliflower, etc., etc., to the stores in town this year, and this fresh, home-grown product has made the imported cold-storage vegetables take a back seat. Judging from this summer's success the market gardens of this district are a very helpful factor in good living up in this part of the North Land. With adequate roads and other proper helps for transportation, the benefit to the town from the fine farms and gardens hereabouts would be still more marked. As an example of the handicap of lack of roads it may be mentioned that one homesteader up the river has a fine big crop of the biggest and finest potatoes, and these could have been sold in town to the actual profit and satisfaction of all concerned,—some having sampled the potato in its cooked state, and coveted a supply,—but the difficulties of transportation through lack of roadways made the cost prohibitive for the townspeople.

In concluding this article, it may not be amiss to mention that the object of The Advance in referring to individuals who are known to have fine gardens is not particularly to "boost" these men, though they certainly deserve the highest praise for their pioneer work in this line and for their enterprise and skill. The purpose, however, is to "boost" the possibilities of the North Land as a market garden, and to counteract so far as possible the idea favoured even in the Farmers' Government farmer circles that this country is only suitable for a cattle ranch style of farming. Another purpose is to emphasize the importance of good roads as a factor in the best growth of the country. Good roads would make it possible for homesteaders to get their produce to markets in the North Land at the least possible cost of time, labour and expense. This would benefit the industrial centres no less than the home steaders.

**COCHRANE FULL TO-DAY
OF GLORIOUS SUNSHINE**

The announcement that the T. & N. O. extension to Tin Can will be started this winter has filled Cochrane with joy unspeakable and full of beans. The Cochrane Post is so exuberantly happy over the announcement that it cannot believe the other story that Hon. R. H. Grant, Minister of Education for Ontario, recently uttered derogatory remarks about the North Land. Without feeling any undue exuberance over the Tin Can proposition The Advance is inclined to agree with The Post as to the interview credited to the Minister of Education. As The Post suggests it does seem as if certain North Land newspapers, and one southern daily that pretends to be a North Land paper, have given to much space to this alleged interview. The Post sums up the fair attitude in a sentence. "The account of the interview," says The Post, "not only entirely ignores the conversation leading up to the bald statements, and which might make the meaning totally different, but is at variance with all the other public utterances made by the same Minister on more than one occasion, that we feel we are fully justified if we do not take the matter seriously without being made acquainted with what led up to it."

Nevertheless, it is a fact that if the Ontario Government had a proper attitude towards the North Land both the Premier and Hon. Mr. Grant would have seen right at the start that this alleged interview was denied or explained. If the interview is allowed to continue without denial or explanation the Government will stand branded as slandering the North Land.

As for the joy of The Post over the promise for an extension of the T. & N. O. to Tin Can, The Advance knows how The Post feels. The Advance would feel about the same way if the Government had the good sense and consideration for the interests of the North Land to start work now on the highway proposition.
