**OPEN SEASONS FOR GAME**  
**IN ONTARIO THIS YEAR**

Rules and Regulations Regarding Fish And Game, of Interest to Local Hunters.

Mr. H. E. Montgomery, secretary of the Porcupine Rod and Gun Club, has received full information regarding the rules and regulations applying this year to hunting, fishing, etc. In a district like this where there is such a general interest in hunting, etc., this information will prove of special importance. All hunters and fishermen should first of all join the Porcupine Rod & Gun Club so as to be in position to secure all the required information and also to show themselves as lined up with those who are working in the best interests of fish and game in this district.

One of the important changes this year is in regard to the open season for partridge. As noted in The Advance last week the open season for partridge this year is from October 15th to Nov. 20th, both days inclusive.

**Open Seasons**

Section 10 of Part 2 of the Ontario Game and Fisheries Act provides that no person shall hunt, kill or destroy:

Deer.—Any moose, deer, reindeer or caribou, in that part of Ontario lying north of the main line of the Canadian Government Railway, formerly the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, from Quebec to the Manitoba Boundary line, except from the 1st day of October to the 30th day of November, both days inclusive.

Any moose, deer, reindeer or caribou in that part of Ontario lying south of the French and Mattawa Rivers, except from the 5th day of November to the 20th day of November, both days inclusive.

Any moose, deer, reindeer or caribou throughout that part of Ontario lying north and west of the French and Mattawa Rivers, except from the 25th day of October to the 30th day of November, both days inclusive.

Any ruffed grouse, commonly known as partridge, except from Oct. 15th to Nov. 20th, both days inclusive, and no person shall take, kill or have in possession any more than ten partridge in any one year.

Woodcock, except from Sept. 15th to Oct. 15th, both days inclusive.

Quail or wild turkey, black or gray squirrel, not to be taken before Nov. 1st, 1923.

Wild geese, except from Sept. 1st to Dec. 15th, both days inclusive.

Duck.—Wood and eider duck not to be taken before Sept. 15th, 1923.

Shore Birds, band-tailed pigeons, little brown cranes, sandhill cranes, whooping cranes, swans, curlews and all shore birds except those in next paragraph, not to be taken before Sept. 15th, 1923.

Plover, Snipe, Etc., black-breasted and golden plover, wilson or jock snipe and the greater and lesser yellow legs, except from Sept. 1st to Dec. 15th, both days inclusive.

Capercaillie, except from Sept. 15th to Dec. 15th, both days inclusive.

**Other Regulations**

Among the other rules and regulations noted in the Act the following may be of interest:—

Section 12—No person shall on the Lord's Day, hunt, take, kill or destroy any game, or use any gun or other engine for that purpose.

Section 13—Licenses are necessary for hunting deer. Cow moose, calves, etc., are not to be killed. No resident or non-resident hunter to kill or take more than one deer, bull moose, reindeer or caribou during one season. Two or more persons hunting together and holding licenses may kill an aggregate of not more than one deer for each member of the party, but this shall not apply to deer taken under the authority of a special camp license which entitles organized hunting parties to kill one deer to be eaten in camp, and such license may be issued to every six persons. No person who has taken or killed any bird or animal suitable for food shall allow the flesh thereof to be destroyed or spoiled, and no person who has killed or taken a fur-bearing animal shall allow the skin thereof to be destroyed or spoiled. Provision is also made in this section for the restraint of dogs accustomed to pursue deer.

Section 14—No wild duck, goose or other water fowl shall be hunted, taken or killed from a sail boat, yacht or launch propelled by steam or other power, and no person shall hunt, kill or willfully chase or put to flight any wild ducks or other water fowl that are more than 200 yards from the shore or natural rush bed thick enough to conceal a boat, or from a water line bounding private property. No swivel gun or gun of any kind of a larger gauge than 8, and no contrivance for taking or killing wild swans, geese or ducks, known as sunken punts or batteries shall be used at any time. No blinds or decoys for use in hunting duck or other water fowl shall be placed at a greater distance than 200 yds. from the shore or a na-

tural rush bed thick enough to conceal a boat, or from a water line bounding private property, and all decoys shall be removed from the water during the hours in which shooting is prohibited, and no person shall set out more than one flock of decoys, and no flock of decoys shall consist of more than 50, and no two flocks shall be placed nearer each other than 100 yards, but this shall not apply to two persons hunting together who may place an aggregate of 100 decoys in a flock. No person shall kill or take more than 200 wild ducks in any one year. The purchase or sale of wild ducks, wild geese or other water fowl, snipe, quail, woodcock and ruffed grouse, commonly known as partridge is prohibited.

Section 15—No person shall discharge any gun or other fire-arm at any game between sunset and sunrise. This section also prohibits the use of poison, poisoned bait, etc., in game hunting.

Section 17—No person shall for hire, gain or reward, or hope thereof, hunt, kill or shoot any game, or employ, hire or for valuable consideration induce any other person to do so.

Section 18 forbids the taking, destroying or having in possession of the eggs of any game bird at any time.

Section 19 forbids the presence of masher or armed persons in the neighborhood of game preserves.

Another section of the Act says that no hotel, restaurant or club shall be in possession of any game except under the authority of a license.

Reference is also made to the protection of private preserves, trespass in pursuit of game, etc. No person hunting can enter standing grain without the permission of the owner. Owners of land may warn away trespassers either by verbal or written notice. Signboards at least one foot square on or near the boundary of the land intended to be protected containing a notice to the effect that hunting or shooting is forbidden is considered by the Act as sufficient warning to trespassers. The signboards are to be not more than eighty rods apart.

The Act also deals at length with the rules and regulations governing fish and fishing in Ontario.

Another part of the Act deals with the possession, sale and transportation of fish and game. In the close seasons the possession of fish and game is prohibited except that game lawfully killed or procured may be kept during the period between the end of the open season in any year and the thirty-first day of March in the next year; and the skins of fur-bearing animals may be had in possession under certain permits and regulations. Except under special permit or license no person can sell or offer for sale or buy any game wherever killed or procured, but the person who has lawfully hunted, taken and killed any game may sell the same, or any part thereof, during the open season. No railway or express company, or other common carrier, and no other person shall transport or receive or have in possession in Ontario any deer, moose, elk, reindeer, or caribou, or any head, skin or other part thereof, unless there is attached thereto one of the shipping coupons belonging to a license authorizing the shipper to hunt or kill the same, together with an affidavit of the shipper that the same was lawfully hunted or taken. Fish illegally caught may not be transported.

Part V deals with the license regulations.

Part VII refers to the procedure in prosecutions for offences under the Act, the evidence, penalties, etc.

The little blue booklets received by the Porcupine Rod & Gun Club gave an easily-understood review of all the rules and regulations relating to hunting, fishing, etc. Every hunter in the district, as suggested before, should secure this necessary information in detail by joining the Porcupine Rod & Gun Club. If he wants to go hunting or fishing this year he will find the details very necessary to escape danger of the penalties of the law. In addition by knowing the rules and regulations he will feel he is able to play the game fairly and to co-operate with those who would preserve the fish and game of the province.

**TECK-HUGHES BONDHOLDERS AND SHAREHOLDERS AGREE**

It is understood that the bondholders of the Teck-Hughes have arrived at a plan that promises to be completely satisfactory to the majority of the Stockholders of the company. Details are being worked out and a meeting of the shareholders will be called at an early date to ratify the proposal. It is believed that the new plan will provide a re-organization acceptable to all and that will assure the success and progress of the mine. The Teck-Hughes is said to be making excellent progress at the property and to be making good profits. A settlement of the matter between the Teck-Hughes shareholders and bondholders should pave the way for the proper expansion and development of this promising Kirkland Mine.

**T. & N. O. ADOPTS PENSION PLAN FOR ITS 1800 EMPLOYEES**

Announcement was made last week that the Government had given the necessary approval to the pension plan to be inaugurated by the T. & N. O. Railway Commission. Chairman Geo. W. Lee and the other members of the Commission have had this pension plan under consideration for some time and the details are being very carefully worked out. Under this pension plan the 1800 employees of the T. & N. O. will benefit. A certain sum of money will be set aside each month to be administered by a committee to be composed of representatives of the commission and the employees. It is hoped to make this pension plan of very material benefit to the loyal and long-serving employees of the road. It is understood that the cost of the plan is to be borne altogether by the Commission. The plan will be put into force and effect at an early date.
