Timmins News in Brief

Mr. L. P. Didled, License Inspector for Nipissing, with headquarters at North Bay, has resigned.

Mr. and Mrs. J. D. MacLean returned last week from their wedding trip and have taken up residence in town.

Mr. and Mrs. Mark Bowie returned on Saturday evening after a holiday visit to Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal and other points south and east.

The curfew bell started ringing at 8 p.m. on Saturday night as is customary during the winter months. The change from the summer hour of nine o'clock as usual startled some who fancied the unexpected ringing of the fire bell meant a fire.

Unusually large crowds attended the showing here on Friday and Saturday of the educational motion picture film, "The End of the Road." The purpose of this film is to picture the horrors of venereal disease and to serve as a warning to those who are not careful as to personal purity.

Mr. A. Fernholm, of Haileybury, exhibited at New Liskeard Fair stockings knit by Mrs. Fernholm from yarn made by her from wool off sheep on their own farm. This is a case of direct from the maker to the consumer, and an excellent advertising item for the North Land's industry and enterprise.

There was a meeting last night of the Girls' Hockey Club of Timmins with a view to getting organized for the coming season. Iroquois Falls ladies have a proposition for the formation of a Ladies' Hockey League for the district, to include Timmins, the Falls and Cochrane, but nothing definite has been decided yet. The meeting last night talked over hockey prospects generally, and adjourned until definite arrangements can be made as to the use of the rink and other necessary things.

His many friends here will be interested in the marriage on Sept. 24th of Mr. Jack Stevens and Miss Mary Green, both of Kapuskasing. The event took place at St. Matthew's Rectory, Timmins, Rev. R. S. Cushing officiating. The young couple returned the following day to Kapuskasing to reside. He was a valued member of the Timmins Football Club for a couple of seasons, and many friends here will extend very sincere good wishes.

Another suggestion for the relief of unemployment in Ontario this coming winter is made by the Frontier College, an organization designed to provide educational facilities for men employed in lumber camps and other outpost duties. The Frontier College suggests that the governments and municipalities take up the work of clearing lands in the Clay Belt. The Frontier College argues that this work would be of inestimable value in securing good settlers for the farms so cleared and would be "good business" for all concerned. Also, the Frontier College emphasizes the idea that general clearing of the land would do away with summer frosts.

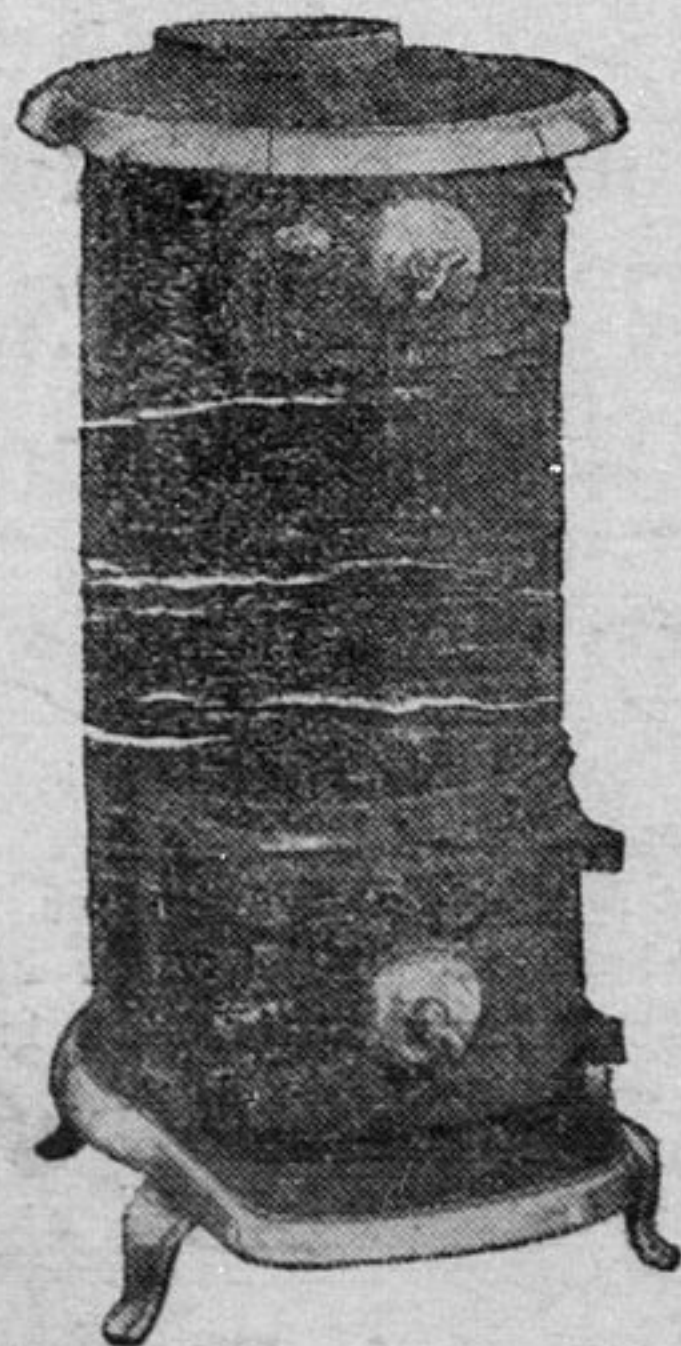
