It is believed that by the diamond drilling still further promising exploration of the property may be made.

**CLAIMS IN GAUTHIER TP.
SOLD BY MR. C. E. PINELLE**

The advantage of adequate transportation facilities is illustrated very strongly by the effect of the proposed building of the railway lines east and west of Swastika by the Canadian Light Railways Co. Within a day or two of the actual letting of the contract for the railway construction Mr. C. E. Pinelle sold four of his claims in Gauthier Township to Boston and Toronto interests. "This is one of the immediate results of assurance of quick building of the railway and would have been impossible otherwise," says Mr. Pinelle. Roads and railroads are the prime necessity for the North Land and it is not too much to say that ordinary roads are the most important just at the immediate present.

**GOVT. ASKED TO INCREASE
NORTH DEVELOPMENT FUND**

At a recent meeting of the Haileybury Board of Trade, with a large and representative attendance present, the following resolution was passed:—"That whereas the prosperity of Southern Ontario is bound up with that of Northern Ontario, and whereas, owing to the rapid increase of the population of Northern Ontario, the development of Northern Ontario is being held back by the lack of funds necessary to finance required improvements, be it resolved that the Ontario Government be requested to increase the Northern Development Fund to \$3,000,000 for the year 1922." This resolution will no doubt be greeted with hearty applause all through the North Land. But that is likely to be the only response from this resolution.

**FAMOUS GRAND OPERA
BARITONE HERE OCT. 28**

Jean Riddez, Gifted Baritone of the Grand Opera of Paris, in Timmins On Friday of Next Week.

Lovers of the musical and the dramatic will have a genuine treat in the New Empire Theatre on the evening of Friday of next week, Oct. 28th, when Mr. Jean Riddez, of the Grand Opera of Paris, will be here under the auspices of the Altar Girls Society of the Timmins R. C. church. This will undoubtedly be the great musical event of the year, something to remember through the days to come. It is not often that towns like Timmins have the opportunity to hear artists of such outstanding merit and fame as Mr. Jean Riddez. Mr. Riddez is on his way to the west to fill engagements there and will only stop at two places in the North Land, Timmins and Iroquois Falls, and both these towns may well consider themselves in luck. It will be remembered what a delightful evening was passed here by those who love high-class music and song when Mr. Paul Dufault, the famous tenor, visited Timmins some time ago under the auspices of the R.C. church. The visit of Mr. Riddez is even more noteworthy, his outstanding being even more attractive.

The Toronto Globe recently in referring to Mr. Riddez, said: "Mr. Jean Riddez revealed himself to be both a singer and an actor of extraordinary power. Rarely is there found such a combination of real dramatic ability and a voice of such range and strength. His acting dominates the performance, and the tragic finale found fitting expression in his last bitter, heart-broken cry after the death of Thais."

The Montreal Star refers to Mr. Riddez as giving additional proof of his powers in his delineation of Athanael. "He was so satisfying in every respect," says The Star, "that he seemed to live the role. He is wonderful."

The Ottawa Citizen says that a voice like that of Riddez is possessed by few with his great histrionic ability. "Jean Riddez as the Cenobite Monk," says the Montreal Gazette, "scored a brilliant success. He gave an excellent characterization bringing out all the dramatic effectiveness of the role. His splendid baritone was in fine prominence especially where, as with the all-absorbing love for the charms of Thais, he brought out to the full his stern sense of sacerdotal duty."

The Boston Herald refers to Jean Riddez as one to be spoken of in terms of enthusiasm, a great artist with a wonderful voice. "An incomparable artist," "the prince of baritones," "a superb actor," "a gifted singer with a voice of singular power and richness,"—these are a few of the enthusiastic references from other journals of high standing that praise only when praise is fully merited.

**ACTIVE DEVELOPMENT
WORK AT THE DAVIDSON**

Active development work is now under way at the Davidson Mine in Tisdale, and a large force of men are busy at the property. It is the intention to largely add to the working force so that operations can be rushed. Among the items mentioned as among the work planned for the immediate future there is:—underground development, a working shaft to be sunk, and the erection of a large mill.

Under the arrangement recently ratified by the shareholders the Davidson will have the proceeds from an issue of approximately \$1,000,000.00 stock available for development purposes.

Sir Archibald Mitchelson, Bart., of London, Eng., who heads the English interests who are coming into the company on a large scale, recently visited the property at Porcupine. On his return, Sir Archibald stated to the Toronto Globe; "Now that we have seen the mine, we feel very happy and I think it is only a question of time until we have a tremendous mine there. I honestly feel it. It will be a question of tip-top handling and management, and we will have expert advice. We have made our plans for further developments, and for sinking a new shaft, and in due course will have the necessary mill. I shall go back to London in a few days feeling very confident, and not having regretted the steps we have taken."

Messrs. Smith and Travers have moved their drills unto the Davidson property and are busy at work. It is understood that between 3000 and 4000 feet of diamond drilling will be done on the property now.
