Timmins News in Brief

Mr. Merton Moore returned last night from a visit to Midland.

Work is in progress this week in improving the road at the McIntyre Hill, some of the hump at the brow being cut away.

Mrs. Moffatt, of the Cairns Hospital, returned Monday evening from a visit to Toronto and other points south.

Mr. Shortie, some fifteen or twenty years ago one of the well-known lumbermen of the North Land, was a visitor to Timmins this week, the guest of Mr. Chas. Pierce.

It is understood that Mr. Art Troop has gone to Iroquois Falls where he will be engaged this winter as coach for the lively hockey team of the Paper Town.

The services at Schumacher Presbyterian church, now held in the evenings on Sundays, are attracting special notice on account of the fine music rendered. The Schumacher Choir has a noteworthy list of particularly good soloists, while the choir as a whole is an excellent one.

Last night Chief Greer picked up Geo. Watts, of Cobalt, on a charge of being boozey and unruly. George has a big reputation in the North Land as a pugilist and has made many appearances in court for alleged rough-house methods. He told Chief Greer last night that he was the black sheep of the family.

Mr. Robeson was one of the pioneer business men of the North Land having been for several years in business in Haileybury and also being a resident of South Porcupine for a time.

There is a case of smallpox reported in Haileybury, but the case is of very mild type and under prompt quarantine it is not expected that there will be any further cases.

Work on the Peninsula Gold Mine at Night Hawk Lake is progressing in good shape and with excellent results reported. The shaft is now down 125 feet.

The Trethewey has been overhauling its plant at Gowganda on the Castle property. Everything now is in good shape and work may be re-opened at an early date.

Mr. John Dalton returned last week from a business visit to Brampton and other points south. While in the south Mr. Dalton picked up a carload of first-class drivers and saddle horses that no doubt will be snapped up by the people of the district as filling a noteworthy want here.

GOLD NOW REPORTED AS BENEATH COBALT'S SILVER

One of the latest stories going the rounds is to the effect that there are gold values in ore beneath the silver values of Cobalt. In other words the optimists and the thoughtless are suggesting that there is a "gold camp" beneath the silver camp at Cobalt and that after all the silver is taken from Cobalt mines, the mines can turn automatically into gold mines by simply "mining at depth." While this is no more than a romantic notion that has been mentioned on previous occasion, it has recently been given a sort of support by the annual report of the manager of the Kerr Lake mine which report mentions gold below the diabase, and says that while the values encountered are not of commercial interest they definitely indicate the possible existence of gold-bearing formation associated with the underlying basalts. At various times in the past gold values have been obtained in ore at the Cobalt mines. But these values, of course, have had little practical or commercial significance. In certain of the Porcupine gold mines a quantity of silver is recovered from the gold ore milled each year, but that does not make the Porcupine a silver camp in any measure. Mining silver does not show many signs of being a profitable venture in the Porcupine, and mining gold in Cobalt looks no more rosy. But Porcupine as a gold camp has silver on the side, and Cobalt as a silver camp may have some gold as a by-product.

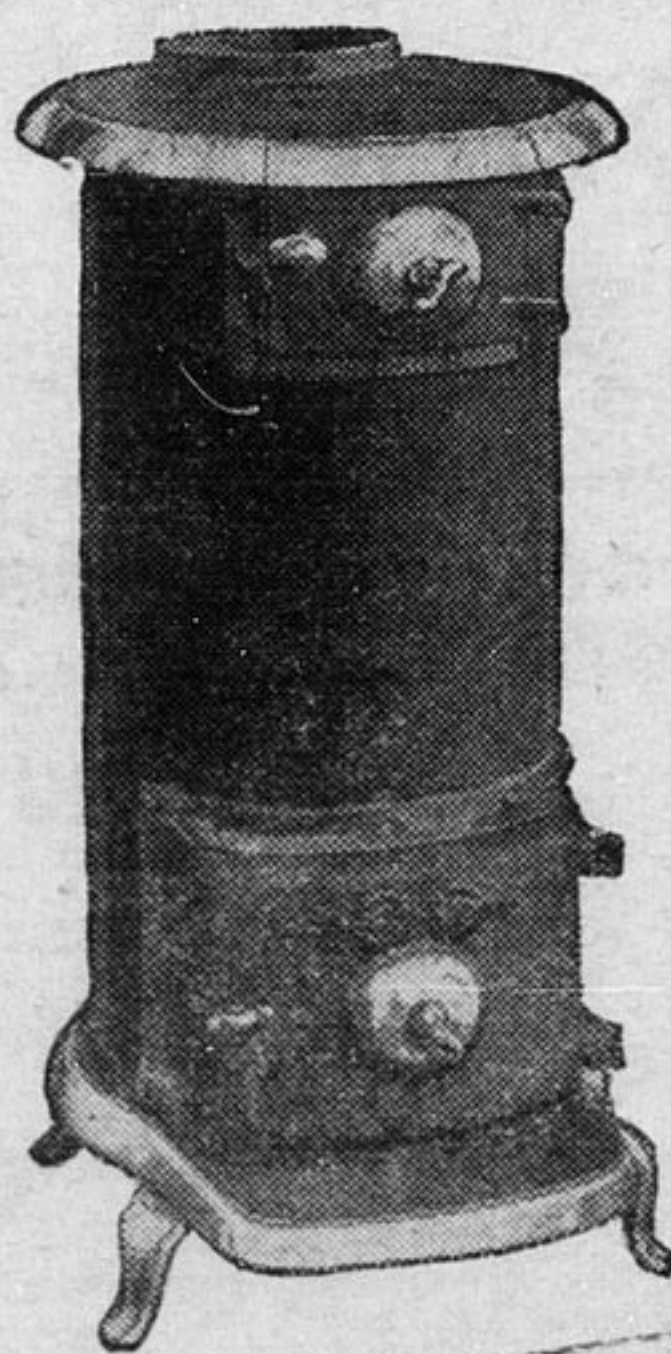
