### OVER EIGHTY PUPILS NOW AT MATTAGAMI SCHOOL

Trustees Providing Further Accommodation and Planning for New School Next Summer.

The neat new school built this year for School Section No. 1, Mountjoy, usually known as the Mattagami school, is proving inadequate for the accommodation of the unusual number of pupils seeking its accommodation. But with the enterprise and public spirit that the district is coming to expect as a matter of course from the people of Mattagami prompt steps are being taken to provide complete accommodation for all the school children of Mattagami. As a temporary means of getting over the problem, a building is to be erected at once opposite the present school. This new building will be used this year for school purposes, but it will be so constructed as to be easily turned into a residence next year and so disposed of without loss and perhaps at an actual profit. Next year the plan is to build a structure that will be ample for the needs of the present and the immediate future. The school built this year at a cost of \$2500.00, and the new school now to be erected at a cost of approximately \$1000.00 will provide

immediate accommodation, while next year they will be replaced by a building designed to fully meet the needs for a few years.

Last year the Mattagami Public School had an attendance of 23 and this was considered large in view of the fact that the section had just been organized. Temporary accommodation for the pupils was provided in Mr. John Power's hotel, and the school trustees at once got busy to provide suitable quarters of a more permanent nature. The new school, finished this summer, was accordingly planned and carried along, and as it would accommodate more than double the number of children on the roll last year it was naturally considered to be large enough for immediate needs. The Mattagami district, however, has grown greatly during the past few months. There has been prosperity and progress in all parts of the district, but Mattagami seems to have had a double share of expansion. In no part of Timmins or the settlements adjacent to this town has there been such a large amount of building as in what is known as Mattagami. As the greater part of the building has been of homes, the population has very materially increased. Consequently, last week saw an attendance of 82 at the school, with the possibility of still more pupils if accommodation could be provided. The trustees, however, are meeting the situation and will

provide full accommodation. As noted above a temporary new school will be erected opposite the present new school, another teacher will be added, and the good work carried along for the rising generation. Then, next year a large new school to accommodate the needs will be built and equipped.

### LADIES OF DISTRICT TO HAVE HOCKEY LEAGUE

The ladies of the district have organized a hockey league for a series of games between the ladies' hockey teams of Timmins, Iroquois Falls and Cochrane. The organization will be known as the Women's N.O.H.A. At a recent meeting held in Iroquois Falls, the organization was duly started off with the following officers elected:—President, Miss Lillian Davidson, Iroquois Falls; Vice-President, Miss Anderson, Cochrane; Secretary, Miss Ruth Bruton, Iroquois Falls. These officers with a representative from each team will form the Executive. A schedule of the games to be played will be drawn up after the N.O.H.A. other dates are arranged. The ladies are looking forward to a good season with lots of wholesome exercise and sport for themselves and much interest for the public.
