timate that the money necessary could be secured he thought.

Mr. Lillieo's resolution that the old law be reverted to in regard to prospectors having the right to timber on their claims caused much discussion. The motion was referred to the local boards for their opinion.

When the election of officers came on, Mr. Mathewson, of Cobalt, paid tribute to the services of Mr. McInnis in the past year and nominated him again as President. From all over the room seconds arose, and the election was put through unanimously with much enthusiasm. The election of Mr. Ebbitt as secretary had the same enthusiasm and unanimity, and the selection of Mr. H. E. Mathewson, Cobalt, as Vice-President, also met with the unanimous approval of the delegates.

It was announced that Premier Drury had promised the most serious attention to the memorandum setting forth the needs of the North Land, and as soon as the election was over he would take the matter up fully.

After the meeting the delegates were taken on a tour of the paper mill and were impressed and pleased with the immensity of the industry and its modern equipment and conduct.

BANQUET AT THE FALLS AN OUTSTANDING EVENT

Annual Associated Boards of Trade Dinner "Simply Great" in Every Way.

The annual dinner of the Temiskaming Associated Boards of Trade held in the Town Hall at Iroquois Falls last Thursday evening was one of the most outstanding events of its kind ever staged in the North Land, and the people of Iroquois Falls certainly deserve the highest credit and congratulations for the pleasure and profit of this decidedly noteworthy occasion. The hall was beautifully decorated, the tables being brightened by flowers and greens, the whole making a strikingly artistic setting, for which Mr. U. T. Heard deserves the many compliments called forth from the visitors. The abundance of good things to eat, the perfect service, the general good work of the ladies in charge of the dinner, all show that Iroquois Falls is adept at knowing just how to do things unusually well. The programme was equally good. The special speakers for the evening included the famous Col. George Ham, known all over the world as a prince of after-dinner speakers and a king of good fellows; Mr. G. C. Bateman, manager of the LaRose Mine, Cobalt; Mr. E. J. Zavitz, Provincial Forester; Mr. John Scully, Chief Supt. Algoma Division C.P.R.; Mr. J. H. Wetmore, U. S. Consul at North Bay. Mr. R. A. McInnis, President of the Associated Boards, occupied the chair in very pleasant way and his opening address was a striking review of the North Land, its problems and possibilities. Mr. Bateman dealt with the mining question in very interesting and effective manner. Special reference should be made to his mention of the Government's receipts and expenditures from the mining industry of the

North Land. Last year \$1,137,000 was taken in and \$218,000 expended, half of the latter on oil and fuel investigation. "A return to the Government from mining of 1000 per cent.," said Mr. Bateman. "Premier Drury at Cochrane, he continued, "spoke of the North as the treasured daughter of Old Ontario. I would like to remind the honourable gentleman that the poor girl needs clothes." Mr. Zavitz gave a very comprehensive review of forestry matters. In an unusually witty address Mr. Scully dealt with railways and their assistance in development. Col. Ham kept his audience convulsed with laughter most of the time, but also had some information and suggestions of great value, emphasized by apt anecdote and happy humour. The addresses all had material for much more extended reference than can be made here and further attention will be given them in future issues.

The Falls more than did itself proud with its array of musical and entertaining talent for the occasion. The visitors were delighted and astonished with the striking excellence of every number. Mr. J. W. Ramsay won two very enthusiastic recalls by his excellent solo singing. He has a fine tenor voice, well-trained, and he sings with an expression and talent that gives his selections a double value. He sang "Roses of Picardy," "Somewhere a Voice is Calling," "I'll sing Three songs of Araby," and "I Passed by Your Window," all delighting the audience. The Minstrel Show made a very strong hit. The two hundred or so present at the event demanded "More, More!" The minstrels are unusually good. The endmen, Bill Tierney and Bill Asseltine, certainly got the laughs going. Tierney's rendition in operatic fashion of "Give Me the Saw" was a "scream" in more ways than one. It took the crowd. Bill Asseltine proved himself an artist, a genius, indeed, with his character representations in dialect, being Italian, French, English or what not to the life. Solos by Mr. A. J. Hodgson and Mr. Vincent Steinyway and a quartette by Messrs. Hodgson, A. A. Scott, Fred Jennings and Jas. Spence, also delighted the big crowd. Mr. Steinyway's fine voice and his gifted rendition of a fine love song won a very marked encore.

Dr. J. A. McInnis, Mayor of Timmins, moved a very hearty vote of thanks to all concerned in the great success of this wonderful banquet, and especially to the ladies, and Mr. N. J. McAulay seconded the motion which carried with very hearty cheers.
