FINE START MADE THIS YEAR BY NIGHT CLASSES

Last Year These Classes Were Noteworthy, But Promise to be More So This Year.

The first of the evening classes last week started out with an attendance of 33, which is much above last year's opening figures. Since then the average attendance has been 45 or 46, which is also above last year's record. The classes last year were recognized as being unusually successful, but this year's success will eclipse that of last year from present prospects. The classes started last week were as follows: Sewing, Electricity, Machine Drawing, Shop Mathematics, and English for non-English speaking people. The pleasant sight was seen last week of ten pupils who could not speak a word of English in a class studying their hardest to acquire a knowledge of the language.

The evening classes are under the auspices of the Ontario Department of Education and the Timmins Public School board. They offer a wonderful opportunity for education and betterment to all who are willing to spend a few hours a week for their own improvement. In each class expert teachers in that particular line are here ready to give the pupils all possible assistance. The fees are only nominal. Mr. C. S. Carter, principal of the Public School, will be pleased to give full details of the courses, etc., to any enquirers. There is still opportunity to join these classes.

It is intended this year to excel last year's good record for steady attendance at these classes. This year each teacher will see to the attendance of the pupils in that particular class. In this way it is expected that a much closer check will be kept on the attendance and the students thus generally be benefitted, and the classes be even more successful.
