**CASE AGAINST MRS. ABDU
POSTPONED ONCE MORE**

Mrs. Aboud Reported to Court at Fall Assizes as Very Ill in Toronto Hospital.

The case of most interest to the people of this district at the sittings this week of the higher court at Haileybury with Judge Masten presiding was that of the King versus Mrs. Nellie Aboud. This case arose from the destruction by fire a couple of years ago of the premises in Moneta occupied by Mrs. Aboud. Circumstances in connection with the fire led to the arrest of Mrs. Aboud and her facing a charge of arson. The case was sent to the higher court of criminal jurisdiction and has been called more than once in Haileybury. At one session of the court much evidence was heard and the case then laid over to the next court. At this next court Mrs. Aboud was reported to the court as too ill to appear and the case was laid over to the present sittings. This week again Mrs. Aboud was too ill to appear. It is understood that she is in a Toronto hospital. As a consequence of her illness, the case was again adjourned to the next session of the court, which will be in the spring of 1922.

A number of witnesses in the case have to go down from here to Haileybury every time the case is scheduled for trial. These include Chief Greer, Fire Chief Boriand and others. They returned here on Tuesday night, the illness of the defendant not making it necessary for them to be called.

**MAN LIVING ALONE NEAR
CONNAUGHT SHOOTS SELF**

Last week word reached town of the dead body of a man being found in a shack some three miles from Connaught. Coroner H. E. Montgomery and Provincial Police Inspector Walter Moore went to the scene of the tragedy on Friday and after an investigation it was decided that an inquest was not necessary, all the evidence in the case pointing to the fact that the case was clearly one of suicide. The dead man was a Finlander known as Jack Kukonen who lived by himself in a shack about three miles from Connaught. Apparently the man had shot himself on Thursday the weapon used being a hunting rifle and the bullet entering the left breast had caused speedy death. Kukonen was very little known in the district, but so far as can be discovered he has no near relatives in this part of the country.

**THREE MONTH SENTENCE
FOR BEATING HIS WIFE.**

At the police court on Tuesday last Magistrate Atkinson sentenced Wm. Sopar to three months in jail for wife beating. It is only a very few weeks ago since Sopar faced a similar charge. Accordingly the Magistrate realized no doubt that this wife-beating business was not an accident but more like a habit. At the same court, S. Martin, second-hand dealer, was fined \$5 and costs for not keeping a proper set of records of business transacted, as required by law. Three gentlemen paid a total of \$50.00 for being more or less drunk, the "more" guys paying \$20 each and the "less" one ten and costs. B. Russell was fined \$500.00 and costs on a charge of illegally selling liquor. Pete Peterick was again before the court for trespass and annoyance of the Hyrteck family. Some weeks ago on a similar charge Pete was allowed to go with a warning to keep away from the people who evidently did not want him around. On that occasion the Magistrate was lenient because Pete had been rather badly beaten up in connection with the affair. Thursday, however, the Magistrate emphasized his advice to Pete to keep away by fining him \$50.00 and costs.

There were also a couple of assault cases dealt with at Thursday's court. W. Gulka charged Mike Latoski with assault. The evidence, however, went to show that Gulka had gone to Latoski's house and Mrs. Latoski had been forced to use the broom on his head to get him to leave. Latoski agreed with his wife to the extent of landing on Gulka also. Magistrate Atkinson dismissed the case, the evidence suggesting that Gulka had brought the trouble on himself. S. Olynyck charged with assault on a family at Schumacher did not escape punishment from the court. The evidence showed that he had visited a house in Schumacher and starting with argument had ended with what is technically termed "rough house" tactics. The lady of the house and a man who happened to be there at the time were both badly beaten up and required the services of a surgeon before Olynyck was through. A charge of breach of the O.T.A. was also laid against Olynyck, but this was withdrawn after the Magistrate sentenced him to nine months for the assault charge.

**PARTY OF THREE BROUGHT
OUT THREE FINE MOOSE.**

Three fine moose heads are attracting much attention this week in the window of Feldman Bros. new store, corner of Third Avenue and Balsam street. The horns on one of these heads have a spread of 55 inches, while another has a 50-inch spread. The third head is of a younger bull, but it is a nice one too. These three fine moose heads were brought to town last week by Messrs. W. McCracken, Jack Thomas and B. Byck, after a brief hunting trip. Messrs. McCracken and Thomas left some days ago for a hunting trip and on the first day out encountered the third member of the party who accompanied them in their work of tracking the big moose. They sighted no less than twelve, nearly all big fellows, on the one day, and so each member of the little party was able to bring home a noteworthy trophy of the chase. They are not telling the exact location of their happy hunting ground, intending rather to visit the same district again next year and get another each of the magnificent dozen of big moose sighted this year.
